### SHORT SESSION COUNTY COURT

#### Small Number of Bills--Routine Work.

The county court of Morrow county met in regular session Wednesday of last week.

The session was short, the business being finished up in two days. Judge Patterson presided with a full board in disposing of the business.

The first business was the auditing of claims. One hundred and eighty-five bills were allowed, amounting in the aggregate to \$6,721.30, divided as follows: General fund, \$3,723.44. Road fund \$2,997.86.

J. B. Subert was appointed constable of Lexington precinct to fill the vacancy caused on account of J. A. Hoffman, the duly elected constable, failing to qualify.

The bond of N. E. Winnard as coroner was accepted by the court. The bond of Kerr, Gifford & Co. was accepted. Also the bond of the Interior Warehouse Co.

The official bond of Mose Ashbaugh as justice of the peace for the second J. P. district was approved by the court.

The bond of J. M. White as justice of the peace of the Lexington district, was accepted.

The resignation of C. F. Niles as supervisor of Irrigon road district was accepted.

It was ordered by the court that a salary of \$15 per month be paid for the term of one year from July 1, 1908, to W. C. Cason, deputy sheriff at Ione.

E. C. Hamilton was appointed road supervisor to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of C. E. Niles at Irrigon.

P. M. Christenson was appointed road supervisor of district No. 15.

John W. Brown was appointed road supervisor to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of H. P. Long in road district No. 2.

The sum of \$250 was appropriated from the general fund to defray the expense of securing and shipping an exhibit of the products of Morrow county for the district fair at Pendleton. The warrant was drawn in favor of D. C. Gardane who was appointed to represent the county in looking after the exhibits at the fair.

### Closing Out the Year.

Next Sunday will close out the year's pastorate of Rev. Orr, at the Heppner charge of the South Methodist church.

### BIG SAVING ON SALT

#### Stockmen Will Save \$360 on First Shipment.

Morrow county stockmen will soon receive a shipment of 60 tons of salt from the Association Salt Co., of Ogden, Utah.

Through the efforts of the Oregon Woolgrowers' Association in conjunction with the Idaho growers, a big saving on salt will be made in both states.

The growers own a controlling interest in a Utah salt mine and by getting out the salt at lowest cost together with a big reduction in freight rates on salt will mean a saving of at least \$6 a ton to the Morrow county stockmen.

Sheepmen tributary to Heppner own 10,000 of the 50,000 salt mine shares allotted to the Oregon Woolgrowers' Association. This entitles the growers here to 100 tons of salt.

A shipment of 60 tons has been ordered and is now on the road.

W. B. Barratt, the well known sheep man, is looking after the shipment.

This salt will be laid down in Heppner at about \$14 per ton. The former price was from \$20 to \$22 per ton.

### OBJECT TO SHEEP DIPPING

#### Deputy Inspector Enjoined at Echo.

Deputy Sheriff Blakely was in Echo last week to serve a temporary writ of injunction upon Deputy State Sheep Inspector J. H. Bryant, restraining him from dipping a band of about 5000 sheep recently brought to Umatilla county from the state of Washington by Bryson & Adams.

Those unacquainted with the heroic struggle that has been made by Deputy Inspector Bryant during the past two years, have no perception of the amount of labor that has been injected into the work of eradicating the disease of scab from the sheep in this county, and his close watch that this dreaded disease does not again get started is highly commendable. The increased revenue now being realized by sheep men from their herds over what used to be the income from their ragged and diseased bands is so great that the local sheep men are unanimously in harmony with the inspector, but those bringing bands from Washington, which state is now in quarantine, cause a little anxiety on the part of the inspectors, and the enforcement of the law which requires the incoming herder to notify the inspector before passing the mile limit from the border, and then require compliance with this order is thought by some to be harsh, and they show fight. Then again the fact that herding is done in the reserve, or upon government land directly under government laws and control, gives a chance for objection and the restraining order.

However, Mr. Bryant's firm stand in enforcing the laws is to be commended, and should be upheld to the point of reason and justice.

### Death of Mrs. Al. Roberts

Mrs. Martha Roberts, wife of A. A. Roberts, receiver of the United States land office at LaGrande, died at her home last Friday forenoon at 11 o'clock.

Mrs. Roberts had been a sufferer for a long time. After spending eight months in Arizona, in the hopes of benefitting her health, she returned to her husband in La Grande but gradually grew weaker until death ended her suffering.

Mrs. Roberts was the daughter of Ed. Matlock, at one time sheriff of Morrow county and a pioneer family of Heppner and this county.

While Mrs. Roberts was born at Eugene she came to this county when a child and from long residence can be claimed as a Heppner girl.

She was a woman with a sweet and loving disposition, always cheerful even in the midst of her great suffering, and her presence always furnished a bright ray of sunshine, not only in the home but in the community.

She was born March 16, 1870. Seventeen years ago on the 30th day of last month, she was married to A. A. Roberts. They lived in Heppner for seven years, in Portland for four years and four years in La Grande.

She leaves a husband and one son, Eddie.

At the time of her death she was attended by her husband and three sisters, Mrs. E. A. Vaughan and Mrs. T. W. Ayers of Pendleton, and Mrs. Frank Richardson, of Portland. Leslie Matlock of Portland is an only brother.

The remains arrived in Heppner Saturday evening accompanied by the husband and son, Congressman W. R. Ellis and wife, W. F. Matlock and wife, Dr. E. A. Vaughn and wife, T. W. Ayers and wife, Geo. Roberts and wife, Mrs. James Keeney, Mrs. Frank Richardson, Leslie Matlock and T. J. Matlock.

They were met at the depot here by a number of Heppner friends and delegations from both the Elks and K. of P. lodges.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon by Rev. Orr at the South Methodist church, interment immediately following at the Heppner cemetery.

The floral tributes were many and beautiful.
