This has been done in the shape of a large barn 220 feet long by 42 wide, which will afford box stalls for 40 horses, each stall being 11x12 feet, and these are located on either side of a 17 foot driveway, which extends the entire length of the structure. The barn is fitted with all accommodations for the horses, and it is well lighted and ventilated. There is barn equipment now for 250 standardbreds and thoroughbreds.

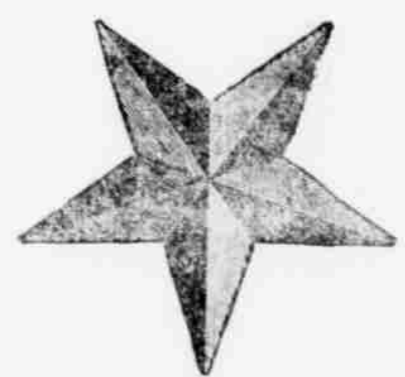
