Nobody said anything about the state fair at Salem bringing rain this time.

Heppner needs more residence buildings. The demand never was greater for residences. There are not enough houses to supply the demand.

The State fair at Salem, which closed Saturday, was the most successful fair ever held at the capital city. The attendance was large from all over the state. Such meetings will help to join common interest in the state of Oregon.

The Portland Telegram is for a time the theatre drop curtain advertising and is devoting much space to the subject. To prohibit this kind of advertising at one swipe, where would that class of advertisers who never place an ad in a newspaper put their spurs? and then what a blank stare there would be while the peanuts are being munched between acts.

The Eugene Commercial Club has voted to continue promotion work and agreed to raise \$15,000 for the next year, as against \$10,000 the past year, to carry on the work. A population of 15,000 by January 1, 1910, is the slogan for the campaign. The enterprise of Eugene citizens has made the university city one of the best towns in the northwest. This spirit will give to Eugene the coveted 15,000 people by 1910, and probably more.

That the big Chicago mail order houses have suffered severely in the campaign being waged by the country newspapers for the protection of home merchants and by the recent hard times is shown by the annual report of Sears, Roebuck & Company, the largest concern of its kind in the world. The net profits for the year fell short over a million dollars from the preceding year, and there was a falling off of about 20 per cent in net sales. A "home industry" crusade has been carried on by the local newspapers throughout the central west during the last year or two, and it is believed that this movement, as much as the hard times, may have had its influence upon the mail trade. The business of the mail order houses will continue to fall off. The people are beginning to realize that filling the purses of Eastern millionaires is not much help to the local community.

The result of decreased majorities in the staunch old Republican state of Maine, in the recent election, is looked to by the opponents of Mr. Taft as to mean much, for Mr. Bryan. While the election was influenced greatly by local affairs, still it does mean something, and should and probably will result in good for the Republican candidate for the presidency. It will bring the Republicans of the country to a point where they can better realize the fact there is actual need of organization and concentration of forces to win. Here in Oregon we can fully realize this fact. The Republican party has been badly rent by strife and selfishness and too many of its followers have been "getting even" magnificently by turning everything over to the Democrats. Do the Republicans now want to get even again by turning over the state to Bryan. This decision is absolutely under the control of the Republicans of Oregon.
