GROWTH OF TAFT SENTIMENT.

Everyone begins to distinctly feel the turn in the political tide. Manifestly there seems to be a recession, the Bryan wave having reached its maximum, and is now distinctly sinking at the crest.

At the outset Taft was both helped and handicapped by the President. Notwithstanding the many things that he had himself done and the reputation he had made in the colonial possessions, likewise in the President's policies for which he spoke but which another man stood for in the public eye.

This placed him at a great disadvantage at the beginning of the campaign. But since it has been tremendously stimulated by Mr. Roosevelt's interjection into it and by Mr. Taft's great swing around the circle in his speechmaking tour. Now that the man himself is being discovered in his true proportions and the public gets a glimpse of his fine judicial character he has grown enormously in public estimation. Mr. Bryan has the disadvantage of opposition within what should be his own camp, that is from Debs and Hisgen. The votes thus diverted are apt to hurt vitally in the sections where he most needs them. This, in addition to the growth of Taft, which is more and more surprising as the days go by, seems calculated beyond all doubt to inflict upon him his third and final defeat. — Portland Telegram

A Good School.

Superintendent Notson visited the public school at Irrigon, Wednesday and Thursday of last week. He reports that the school is making excellent progress under the management of Prof. L. B. Kicker, principal, and Miss Carrie Morgaridge, assistant. While it would be better for the school if another teacher were employed and the third room occupied, the work is not being slighted. The pupils show a spirit of self-reliance, and are helping themselves. The teachers are giving much individual assistance outside of the regular school periods.

The school house is a very neat, substantial, up-to-date, three room building. It is well furnished with the best of school furniture. The windows are fitted with patent slat shades, which make it possible to properly regulate the light and ventilation. The walls are painted a tint which avoids cross lights and strong reflections. The blackboards are excellent, and in the lower grades they are placed within easy reach of the little folks. The halls are large and conveniently arranged. Wash basins, towels, mirrors, and combs are provided in liberal quantities, which enable the pupils to remove the dust with which they sometimes come in contact on the way to school. However the fine windbreaks which are growing about every home and around every acreage tract will, in a short time diminish greatly the discomforts arising from the dust. The grounds about the school house are planted with trees, and within a few years, they will make a delightful park. The outbuildings are neat, substantial, and kept in excellent condition.

The school sentiment which prevails in the town is good. The people are determined to have the best within their power to reach. One familiar with school work would not need to look further than their library to be convinced of that fact. The outlook for a successful year's work is very bright.
