THE GOOD ROADS CONVENTION.

The good roads convention to be held in Heppner at a future date to be fixed by Judge Scott, president of the state association, should not be lost sight of by the people of this county. Every resident and especially the farmers would be benefited by better roads. With small population and great territory covered, the question naturally arises of what can be accomplished against such obstacles with which we are to contend? This is exactly what the proposed good roads convention is called for. It is for the exchange of ideas, as well as the benefits to come from the knowledge to be obtained from specialists in road making. It is to find what we can do by organized effort. We cannot expect to do everything at once, but in order to do anything at all a start must be made. Here in Morrow county, much money has been spent on the roads with apparently but little accomplished toward the desired result. In the respective communities much complaint can be heard. The farmer who has a bad road over which to haul his products to market is asking for a better road, but it is quite likely that he will stay away from the good roads convention and do nothing to aid in his own behalf. The county court should not be censured for work previously accomplished. The members of this body in looking after the many details of county affairs, are good business men but not road specialists. Now what is the matter? Let us get together and see if we can improve conditions. The county court can do nothing without the hearty support of the citizens of the entire county.

The Pendleton scouring mills cleaned up the run for the season last Saturday, having made one of the biggest runs in the history of the scouring plant. Records of the work of the season show that Pendleton has handled and shipped more wool than any other point in the West, the total shipments exceeding 7,500,000 pounds. Great Falls, Montana, comes next with 6,000,000 pounds to her credit.

The scouring mill during the season's run of 20 weeks paid out \$20,000 in wages. And with all this showing Pendleton had to work hard to keep her woolen mill from being moved away which seems queer, indeed.

In the competition for prizes on grain at the Pendleton fair, the fact that Morrow county carried off almost everything on wheat, barley and oats means more than realized generally, even by our own people. It should be remembered that we were in competition with Umatilla county, which is without doubt one of the greatest wheat growing districts in the United States. Morrow county wheat yields are gradually increasing under better methods of farming. The quality is such that it is much sought after for milling purposes.

The fake stove peddlers are in the country again. It is the same old story. Selling cheap wares, dodging taxes and evading the law in relation to peddlers licenses. A couple of these fellows were fined \$300 each in Wasco county the other day. May they get the same medicine here.

The big crowd and great enthusiasm shown at the meeting Saturday evening when Senator Fulton addressed the citizens on the political issues, is at least evidence that Morrow county is strong for Taft.

The farmers of Morrow county are losing no time in seeding a large acreage of summer fallow. There is plenty of moisture and grain will make a good growth this fall.

Martin, the man who brutally murdered and robbed Nathan Wolf in Portland, has been found guilty of manslaughter. Such a compromise is justly meeting with censure.

School Notes.

Many inquiries have come to the office of the county superintendent in regard to the compulsory education law. For the information of the school officers, teachers, and patrons, a summary of the law will be published soon and distributed to the clerks for distribution among the people of the respective districts. There is but one truant officer at present in the county, but he is authorized to act in all districts. It is to be hoped that few cases will arise under this law in which it may be necessary to have the penalty applied or even an investigation made by the truant officer.

The State University is offering a correspondence course to teachers free, except a small fee for postage. Those taking the work and passing an examination may obtain credit toward a degree at the University. However, the work is such that many will find it advisable to take advantage of the courses even if they have no thought of obtaining the credit. If you are interested in this line of work, write the county superintendent.

Superintendent Notson visited the school at Lexington, Monday. He found the work moving along smoothly under the management of Principal Wilcox, Prof. McCormick, and Misses Cole and Vaughan. There are classes in ten grades. The schoolhouse has been recently painted, and a number of minor

improvements have been made on the inside. The school grounds are well kept. After much effort, a few trees have been induced to grow, and they add materially to the appearance of the grounds. It is to be hoped that more trees may be grown upon the grounds within the near future. The school is equipped with good blackboards and plenty of them. The library is assuming pleasing proportions, and it is put to good use. There is an excellent school spirit throughout all the grades. The pupils seem to be very much in earnest in their work. The recitations show careful preparation and are marked by thoroughness. The people of the town are justly proud of their school. The indebtedness on the school building will soon be extinguished, and the burden of taxation will be lighter. However, the Lexington people have never complained of the school tax. Backed by a good school sentiment in the community, there is every reason to expect this school to do excellent work, and turn out some strong students.
