As a primary shipping point, Shaliko heads the list with 3,000,000 pounds. Heppner comes second with 2,500,000 pounds to her credit.

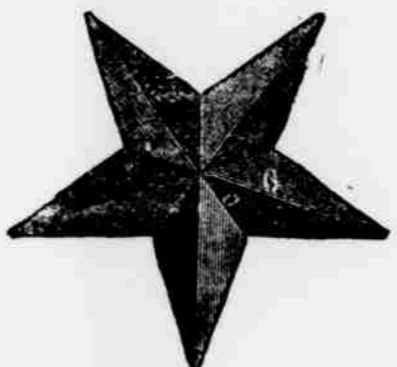

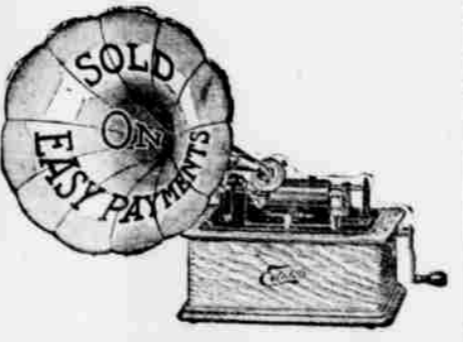
