

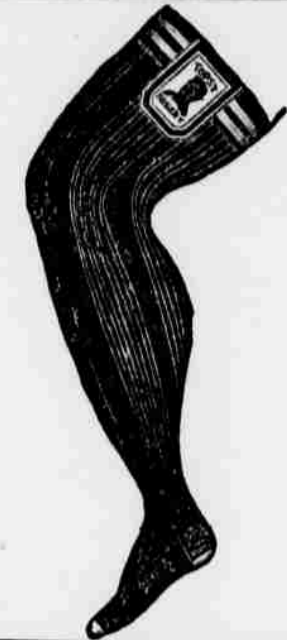


SHAPELY FEET MEAN RIGHT SHAPE SHOES
