RATE INVESTIGATION FINISHED

Large Amount of Data Gathered.

The Oregon Railroad Commission together with representatives of the O. R. & N. held their final meeting in Heppner last week in investigating the question of freight rates on wheat from Eastern Oregon points.

The full board of railroad commissioners, whose members are T. K. Campbell, Chairman, Oswald West and C. B. Aitchison, were present, including C. E. Minier, the stenographer for the commission.

In the selecting and examining of witnesses the commission was assisted by Deputy District Attorney C. M. White.

The O. R. & N. Co. was represented by W. E. Conan and H. C. Oliver of the traffic department and attorney A. Spencer.

The meeting at the court house in this city was the end of a series of meetings which have been held at Wasco, Condon, and Pendleton.

The proceedings at Heppner were practically a repetition of the proceedings at the other meetings, the object being to gather data in relation to farming in order to get at the exact cost of wheat raising in different districts so that the commission can arrive at an intelligent conclusion as to the effect of freight rates on the great wheat growing industry.

The matter of wheat rates over the O. R. & N. has been the subject of considerable investigation for some time. Some time ago complaints were sent to the railroad commission from farmers along the Heppner branch, also from other branch line points, and while the complaints received attention from the commission, not much has been accomplished. However, these complaints have been in the main the cause for the thorough and general investigation which has just been completed.

At the different meetings no less than 40 witnesses have been examined which naturally made up a great mass of data and evidence from the farmers' side of the question.

With this great amount of data together with another large amount of evidence to be submitted by the railroad company, will occupy the attention of the railroad commission for a long time in arriving at an equitable adjustment of the questions involved.

In Heppner, the following witnesses were examined:

Walt Smith, of Ione, C. E. Carlson, Gooseberry, W. B. McAlister, Lexington, E. M. Keithley, Eight Mile, and D. E. Gilman, F. P. Vaughn, W. L. Hendrix, H. F. Tash, T. J. Mahoney, R. F. Hynd, all of Heppner.

The examination of the witnesses which was generally very thorough occupied almost an entire day.

Every item of cost in connection with wheat growing was carefully covered.

F. W. Gaines, who has no connection with the railroad commission, has been at all the meetings.

Mr. Gaines testified at the Pendleton meeting that he had 1000 contracts with Eastern Oregon farmers in which the farmers agreed to pay Gaines one half of any freight reduction that might be secured, (for the first year only) through the efforts of the investigation.

A separate case will be made out of each branch line.

The result of the investigation will be looked to with interest by the farmers of Eastern Oregon.

Committees Well Pleased.

The committees appointed to look after the entertainment of the Oregon State Woolgrowers' Association which met in Heppner last week, wish this occasion to thank the citizens of Heppner who so generously contributed, and by their contribution, presence, word and action, caused the 11th Annual Convention of the woolgrowers of the state of Oregon to go down on record as one of its greatest meetings in point of success.

Much credit is due the local woolgrowers' association of Morrow county who looked so carefully after the wants of the visiting delegates during their stay with us.

The Club rooms were thrown open to the convention, the convention meetings being held in the main hall room, while social gatherings were held in the rooms of the Club upstairs.

This occasion, as well as other occasions we have had, should inspire the people of Heppner to a determination to maintain and keep the Club rooms always open.

We feel that special mention should be made of the banquet given at the Palace hotel. This was certainly the crowning feature of the week. Mr. Wilkins, of the Palace hotel, had assured the committee on arrangements that if the banquet were left to the hotel that the citizens of Heppner would have nothing to be ashamed of.

When the doors of the spacious dining room were thrown open at 10:30 Wednesday night, never a more pleasing sight met the eye of a waiting delegation.

Plates had been spread for 125. No pains had been spared in decorations and flowers to beautify and cheer. For more than two hours intermingled with sweet strains of music from the orchestra, the Palace management continued to serve all that markets could afford and heart and stomach could desire.

Surely the Oregon Woolgrowers will long remember Heppner and the citizens of Heppner should feel proud that they have a hotel so

well equipped and a management that can entertain so royally.
