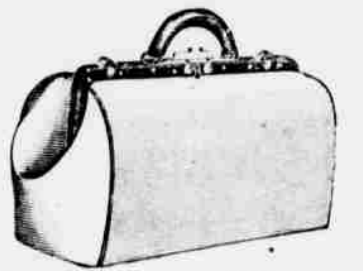

At the last regular meeting of the city council of the City of Waitsburg, Wash., a town about the size of Heppner, it was decided to macadamize the main street. The side walks on the same street in that town are cement and the town in general is tidy and well kept. Why not Heppner? We don't mean to macadamize our main street, but have better cross walks and side walks. Clean up our streets and put on an air of self respect.

California was once known in the Eastern market as the only apple state west of the Rocky mountains, but it enjoys this distinction no longer. Eastern Oregon and Eastern Washington are in the market now with the apples that get the trade and the price not only in our Eastern cities, but now the crowned heads of Europe are feasting on them. According to all reports, about a million fruit trees have been planted in Eastern Oregon and Eastern Washington the last year. New orchards can be found in every locality. The success of the

apple growers in the last two or three years has induced farmers everywhere to plant fruit trees, particularly apples, it being estimated that fully half of the trees planted this year were planted for the purpose of producing commercial apple orchards. The raising of fruit in Morrow County should be more looked after. There is not a creek ranch in this county but what will produce a small orchard and the editor of this paper urges that our people start to planting trees. Hood River, Grand Ronde, or the Touchet Valley, never produced in their history a finer apple than some that were placed on the local market by our farmers during the past season. Morrow County has the soil and the climate for the production of fruit and the day is not far distant when the bottoms along Willow and Rhea creeks will be one immense orchard.
