NATIONAL WOOL-GROWERS' MEETING

To be Held Next Month at Pocatello.

Three thousand sheepmen will attend the forty-fifth annual convention of the National Woolgrowers' association, to be held in Pocatello, Idaho, January 14, 15 and 16 1909. The official call for the convention has been issued by President Fred W. Gooding, and the convention city has completed plans for entertaining the delegates.

This meeting will be the most important in the history of the national organization. Final and definite arrangements for the establishment of a great central wool market at Chicago will be made, and the questions of federal control of grazing on unappropriated public lands, government control of forest reserves and the maintenance of a protective tariff on wool will be considered.

In connection with the convention a midwinter sheep show will be held, at which the city of Pocatello will distribute cash prizes aggregating \$1500 in addition to handsome silver trophy cup which the national association annually offers for the best individual exhibit. Already over 500 sheep in the thoroughbred and graded classes have been entered for the show, and the committee confidently expects that by the time entries close on December 15, 1000 sheep will have been entered.

Announcement is made from national headquarters at Cheyenne that 15,000,000 out of the required 25,000,000 pounds necessary for the establishment of an immense market in Chicago have been pledged by growers in Wyoming, Colorado, Montana, Utah, Idaho, Oregon and Washington. Each state is required to sign up a certain number of millions of pounds of next season's clip to insure success to the movement, and by the time the national convention is called to order it is estimated that 50,000,000 pounds will be pledged and the market made a settled fact.

DEATH OF A PIONEER

Mrs. Sarah Hayes Passes Away at Lone Rock.

Mrs. Sarah Hayes, an early Oregon pioneer, died at Lone Rock last Sunday evening. The funeral was conducted in this city Wednesday by Rev. J. V. Crawford.

Sarah Hayes, whose maiden name was Capehart, was born near Jefferson City, Mo., Nov. 14, 1836. Her parents both died during her infancy. She crossed the plains to Oregon in 1852, and two years later, in 1854, was married to W. J. Hayes in Lane county. She and her husband settled at Myrtle Creek in Douglas county where they resided for a number of years. To them were born four sons and two daughters, all of whom are living but the youngest, the late Charles J. Hayes of this city. Her husband died just twenty years and six months before she answered the summons to join him in the great beyond. Besides she leaves twenty six grand children and fourteen great grand children.

During her residence at Myrtle Creek, thirty four years ago, she obeyed the gospel and from that day lived a consistent, Christian life.

She came to Morrow county in 1877 and has resided here continuously ever since, and in consequence had a very wide acquaintance throughout this section of country, especially among the older settlers, many of whom were the recipients of her kind and motherly ministrations in times of sickness and distress.

Coyote War to Begin.

January is to spell death to the coyotes in the state of Oregon, according to the plans which have been announced by secretary Dan P. Smythe, of the State Sheep Commission and the State Woolgrowers Association. During the coming month the flockmasters of the state are to wage a concerted and systematic warfare upon the greatest enemy the woolgrower has to contend with. Dogs, guns, traps and poison are all to be brought into requisition, and it is expected that the number of coyotes can be greatly reduced during the 31 days in the month which has been designated for slaughter.

The same plan was worked last January, and, according to the reports received from all parts of the state, hundreds of the animals were slain. It was this success of the first effort which led the officers of the state association to repeat the experiment.

School Notes.

Last Thursday, the writer called at the school house in District No. 32, but school was not in session, the teacher, Mrs. Maude Thorp, being sick. There are 14 pupils enrolled in this school. The building is quite old and the furniture is not very good, but a special tax has been voted, and it is understood that the building will be made better.

The next school visited is the Fairview School in District No. 27. Miss Mollie Petre is the teacher. The building and furniture are good. There are shades for all the windows, and neat sash curtains are also provided. There are book-cases for the library books and a cupboard for the dinner pails. A dictionary is provided; also, a few maps. The blackboard is poor, but better boards are to be provided soon. The cold winds are shut out from under the floor by a bank of earth. This saves fuel and protects the feet of the pupils. Window boards are in place to make the ventilation easier and safer. The decorations of the walls are excellent. The enrollment is 25. Excellent work is being done.

I stopped at the school house in District No. 30, to inspect the building, school not being in session. The school house has not been built long. It is a good building. The light is admitted from the rear and left side of the room, which is the best for pupils. The furniture is not very good, but some patent desks have been secured and will be put in place before the next term of school. The blackboard is very good, but there should be more of it. Some maps and physiological charts are provided for the school.

On Friday, I visited the school in District No. 16 near the Ella post-office. Miss Julia Agee is the teacher. There are 19 pupils enrolled. The building is comfortable, and is furnished with good desks. The blackboard is fair, but the space should be increased. Better shades for the windows are needed. The school is provided with a large map of the United States, dictionary, and an excellent planetarium. There are a number

of appropriate pictures upon the walls. A large flag flies from the flag-staff. The pupils seem to be making good use of their time and are making good progress in their work.

I next visited the Juniper Canyon school, District No. 20. Mrs. M. E. Clark is the teacher. There are 10 pupils in this school. The building is new and is a substantial structure. It needs to be painted. The desks are home-made, but they are quite comfortable. A dictionary is provided. The blackboard is fair. The decorations are tasty, among them being a facsimile of the Declaration of Independence. The pupils are orderly and attentive to their work. The teacher is very proud of her school, and the patrons speak in flattering terms of the work being done.

A week of lectures on general agricultural topics begins Jan. 5. A special course for creamery operators and managers runs from Jan. 5 to 15; a course in dairying from Jan. 18 to Mar. 27; a course in horticulture Jan. 11 to Feb. 20; a course in mechanic arts from Jan. 11 to Feb. 20; a course in road construction from Jan. 11 to Feb. 6; a course in household science and art from Jan. 11 to Feb. 20. Special lectures on business methods on the farm will be given.
