**Notice to Fruit Growers.**

You must spray your apple and pear trees within the next 30 days with a liquid made by dissolving 12 pounds blue vitriol in 100 gallons of water. This is the most effective treatment known for all fungus diseases, including anthracnose (derived from anthrax, meaning carbuncle) which forms black spots on the trunk and limbs, which soon destroys the tree. Some of the best authorities say fungus diseases are more destructive and more to be dreaded than all insect life. Every orchard in Morrow county must be cleaned up this season. You have had ample time to accustom yourselves to this work, by using the blue vitriol spray now, and a thorough spraying in February, or early March, with lime and sulphur, either the Rex Spray or Niagara Spray made at Hood River. This will make all trees clean and healthy after the fruit sets. The trees must be sprayed three times at intervals of about 20 days with arsenate of lead. By doing this we will have no more wormy apples. We have not sprayed nearly enough for the Codlin Moth. I am going to devote the larger part of my time with you during this winter. I will show you how to prune and clean your orchards up. You will find it most profitable work. Our splendid success at the Umatilla-Morrow Co. Fair, at Pendleton should greatly encourage all of us. Now I am in deadly earnest, this work must be done as I suggest. I have been most reasonable with all of you. I am determined that Morrow county will make a new record this coming season, and our trees must be in clean, vigorous condition, to get the best results, and our people have had to eat wormy fruit long enough. I am going to be with you a great deal this coming year, and I shall gather a display while inspecting the orchards, and I ask you to begin your plans now to grow choice vegetables and fruits for exhibition.

We should have a street carnival in Heppner for two or three days, before the Pendleton fair, showing our own people what we have. Now I have to depend largely upon your help in this work. The work is so scattered I can't possibly be present at all places while spraying, but I can and will come to your homes and consult with you, and show you how to do. And if you don't try to do anything, I can prevent your selling any unclean fruit, and destroy your diseased trees. I don't expect any trouble in this way. I have been trying to get some word of advice or encouragement from our district inspector, R. H. Weber, at The Dalles, during the three years I have been fruit inspector. I have not received one word from him in regard to it, and I feel that a cussing would be preferable to this Eternal Silence.

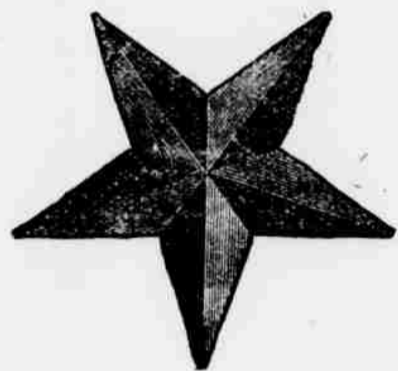
