A little rain might help, but still there is plenty of moisture for present needs. Crops are growing.

One of the largest wool sales that have been contracted in the state of Idaho this year for the 1909 clip was consummated recently. The Dufferfield Live Stock company of Weiser sold its 1909 clip to Harris & Co. of St. Louis at 16 cents a pound, says the Boise Capital News. It is estimated that the clip will aggregate approximately 500,000 pounds, and so far as can be learned this is the largest clip disposed of this year for 1909.

The forty-fifth annual convention of the National Woolgrowers' Association, to be held at Pocatello, January 14-15 16, will be an important meeting. Among the topics to be discussed will be forest reserve regulations, national wool storage and establishment of a central wool market, freight rates, tariff, and the advancement of the wool industry in general. In connection with the convention the annual mid-winter sheep show will be held which will add interest.

Sears, Roebuck & Co., the Chicago mail order millionaires, announces that owing to the passage of the federal pure food and drug law they discontinue the grocery and drug business. It wasn't the passage of the law by congress, but the enforcement of the pure food and drug law by the agents of Uncle Sam that drove them out of the business. And if they cannot follow the business successfully under the pure food and drug law will their mail order patrons guess what they got from the Chicago house before the law was enforced. 1909 will be the travel year for the Pacific Northwest. The most advantageous rates are in this direction. All of the great railroads of the country are going to bend their efforts toward presenting the resources of this portion of the United States through out the East, Canada and Europe. The Portland Rose Show and the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition will be two important features and railroad men in all the large centers of population predict an enormous travel.

Notice to Fruit Growers.

You must spray your apple and pear trees within the next 30 days with a liquid made by dissolving 12 pounds blue vitriol in 100 gallons of water. This is the most effective treatment known for all fungus diseases, including anthracnose (derived from anthrax, meaning carbuncle) which forms black spots on the trunk and limbs, which soon destroys the tree. Some of the best authorities say fungus diseases are more destructive and more to be dreaded than all insect life. Every orchard in Morrow county must be cleaned up this season. You have had ample time to accustom yourselves to this work, by using the blue vitriol spray now, and a thorough spraying in February, or early March, with lime and sulphur, either the Rex Spray or Niagara Spray made at Hood River. This will make all trees clean and healthy after the fruit sets. The trees must be sprayed three times at intervals of about 20 days with arsenate of lead. By doing this we will have no more wormy apples. We have not sprayed nearly enough for the Codlin Moth. I am going to devote the larger part of my time with you during this winter. I will show you how to prune and clean your orchards up. You will find it most profitable work. Our splendid success at the Umatilla-Morrow Co. Fair, at Pendleton should greatly encourage all of us. Now I am in deadly earnest, this work must be done as I suggest. I have been most reasonable with all of you. I am determined that Morrow county will make a new record this coming season, and our trees must be in clean, vigorous condition, to get the best results, and our people have had to eat wormy fruit long enough. I am going to be with you a great deal this coming year, and I shall gather a display while inspecting the orchards, and I ask you to begin your plans now to grow choice vegetables and fruits for exhibition.

We should have a street carnival in Heppner for two or three days, before the Pendleton fair, showing our own people what we have. Now I have to depend largely upon your help in this work. The work is so scattered I can't possibly be present at all places while spraying, but I can and will come to your homes and consult with you, and show you how to do. And if you don't try to do anything, I can prevent your selling any unclean fruit, and destroy your diseased trees. I don't expect any trouble in this way. I have been trying to get some word of advice or encouragement from our district inspector, R. H. Weber, at The Dalles, during the three years I have been fruit inspector. I have not received one word from him in regard to it, and I feel that a cessing would be preferable to this Eternal Silence.
