LONG SESSION COUNTY COURT

Much Business Disposed of by Commissioners.

The County Court met in regular session at the court house, Wednesday of last week.

Being the first session of the year in which the different appointments are made, together with the closing of the business of the old year, the session was a long one, in which a large amount of business was disposed of.

Judge Patterson presided with the full board of commissioners.

The first day's business was taken up principally in auditing claims against the county. In all 256 claims were presented, and the total amount paid out was \$5,081.93. Of this amount \$3920.47 came from the general fund and \$1161.46 came from the road fund.

A. Ives, of Irrigon, was appointed fruit inspector for Morrow county.

J. W. J. Brown was appointed county road viewer for the year 1909.

The jury list consisting of 240 names was drawn from the tax roll.

In the matter of the petition of Luther Huston et al for the establishment of a county road. Granted. County Surveyor Reid, Viewers J. W. Brown and Henry Gay were appointed to meet on February 20, at the starting point of the road, and survey the proposed road.

In the matter of the purchase of a tract of land for the use of an experimental station to be donated to the State of Oregon.

It was ordered as an inducement for the establishment of an experimental station in Morrow county, an appropriation of \$3000, provided the station is established by the state.

The petition of W. S. Smith et al praying for a change in the grade on Lone hill, received favorable consideration. The surveyor and viewers were ordered to meet on Friday, February 12, to lay out the proposed change.

A. J. Cook was re-appointed stock inspector for Morrow county.

Coyote Bounty Law.

That a coyote bounty law will be passed by the legislature now in session at Salem is the opinion of Dan P. Smythe secretary of the state Wool Growers association, who spent several days in Portland in consultation with a large number of the members of the legislature.

Smythe says he was surprised to find so much sentiment in favor of the proposition and anticipates no particular trouble in securing a reasonable bounty at the hands of the legislature. He says there seems to be a general sentiment for the measure, even in the Willamette Valley, where it had been anticipated that the bill would meet with much opposition. It seems that the coyotes have been on the increase in the foothills of the Willamette valley while in the Umpqua valley their depredations have been almost as disastrous as in Eastern Oregon—East Oregonian.
