The following resolution passed at the last meeting of the association held at Heppner, is being featured:

"We, the sheepmen of Oregon, hereby subscribe to the following resolution for the purpose of making special efforts to destroy coyotes, other predatory wild animals throughout Oregon; that every possible effort be made by all sheepmen to destroy coyotes with poison, guns, traps, dogs, and other methods; that we will induce our neighbors and everyone possible to assist us in this crusade against coyotes. That special precaution be taken in putting out poison, that poison be not placed near dwellings or public highways, so that dogs passing would not be liable to reach it; that poison be put out only on our own premises and ranges."

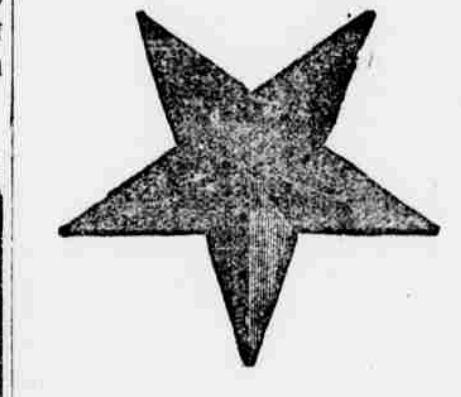
