The bill compelling hotels to furnish sheets nine feet in length has passed. The bill was introduced at the instance of the tall fellows.

The sheep industry in Oregon is estimated to represent a valuation of \$11,000,000 and during the past year returned a profit of nearly two millions, with the employment of 15,000 laboring men.

While the general Rivers and Harbors Bill will not be passed by Congress, the Government will not let construction work now under way be sacrificed for want of a small appropriation. An emergency bill providing for absolutely necessary work will include the waterways of the Pacific Coast.

The United States government has filed 35 suits against the old Oregon & California railroad company, now owned by the Southern Pacific company. Along with the government are more than 100 other individuals and private corporations who have filed suits. The suits are to recover the old O. & C. land grant, over which there has been so much dispute of late years. The land in question comprises 333,283 acres of land, much of this being valuable timber. Owing to the rapidly increasing value of the land such interest is being taken in the suits, which will test the validity of the original grant.

Sportsmen are afraid that a large percentage of the Chinese pheasants in Washington county were frozen during the recent cold snap. Numbers of dead quails have been found since the snow began to melt.

There is a good natured citizen in Astoria, says the Astorian, who feeds the seagulls along with the chickens in his own yard, and from the same pan of feed. And the gulls are always on the spot for the handout, too.

The feeding of birds during the recent cold spell was so universal about Newberg that it appears there was no loss of life among the little songsters around town.

### Origin of Name Chinook.

What is a chinook wind? The question is often asked by recent arrivals from the Eastern states to whom the name has no meaning. Webster defines it thus:

"A warm westerly wind from the country of the Chinooks sometimes experienced on the eastern slope of the Rocky mountains in Montana and the adjacent territory."

Webster might have added that it is experienced all along the Pacific coast, particularly in Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, where the warm breezes originate and have their greatest effect. And he also might have stated they are of frequent occurrence on the east slope of the Rocky mountains, where, in a few hours, they have been known to wipe out snow covering the entire landscape to the depth of two or more feet. In midwinter a chinook is likely to occur over there and soon change the most frigid weather in a springlike days, says the Portland Telegram.

Chinook is the name of a tribe of Indians formerly living in Washington. The name all refers to a jargon of words which were readily understood by Indians of every tribe on the coast.

Relative to what a chinook wind is, District Forecaster E. A. Beals gives this definition:

"It is a wind passing over a mountain. When it descends on the opposite slope the air is compressed and heated dynamically."

William Morris Davis, professor of physical geography in Harvard College, gives a lengthy account of chinook winds in a book entitled, "Elementary Meteorology," which was published in 1894. But in the entire work he fails to tell why they were called chinook winds.

The following is one of the most important extracts.

"One of the most peculiar members of the class of cyclonic winds is found where the indraft is required to pass down from or over a mountain range in its course toward the cyclonic center.

Winds of this kind often have a strong development in the northern valleys of the Alps, where their remarkable heat and dryness were first noted and investigated; the local name there employed, is now extended to other regions as well.

"These conditions are admirably developed along the eastern base of our Rocky mountains in Montana, Wyoming, and Colorado, as

well as in the Northwest territories of Canada. It frequently happens in the winter season that as a cyclonic center moves eastward from British Columbia to Manitoba while an anti-cyclonic follows across Utah, an extended cyclonic circulation is developed over the mountain region. The winds that blow northward along the plains, as the cyclone advances, are soon supplanted by westerly winds, and as these descend from the mountains and flow out upon the plains, all the features of the Swiss foehn are developed. The warm and dry wind thus produced over a belt of country along the foot of the mountains is called a chinook."

A legendary tale has it that the term chinook as applied to these peculiar winds came into general use among the residents along the Willamette and Columbia rivers many years ago in this wise: Becoming weary of paddling up the river in canoes, the Chinook Indians fell into the habit of waiting for their boats with a strip of sail attached, to be propelled by the wind. The only sort of blow which would accomplish this was the kind now referred to as the chinook. When it would begin to stir at a lively rate the residents would remark: "Now watch out for the Chinooks." Hence the origin of the name.
