SHEARING WILL
BE EARLYTo Commence at Echo on
30th of Next Month.

Jake Wattenburger returned this week from Echo, where he had been to make arrangements for sheep shearing operations.

Mr. Wattenburger states that he will start his big machine shearing plant at Echo on the 30th of March. This will be about 10 days earlier than last year.

Already 80,000 head of sheep have been engaged for shearing this season by Mr. Wattenburger. This is an increase of 27,000 head for this plant over last year's engagements.

Mr. Wattenburger thinks that wool will be cleaner and better this year than last.

He will employ 24 shearers and 11 helpers making a total crew of 35 men.

BUYING GILLIAM
COUNTY SHEEPSheepmen Save Money by
Selling at This Time.

C. H. Ragland, the sheep buyer who came in last week from Fort Benton, Montana, has purchased about 10,000 head of lambs, a few of them being two-year-old wethers but mostly mixed yearlings. The price paid for the yearlings was \$4 per head with the wool on and at the present price of sheep this is equal to receiving 18 cents per pound for the wool. It is estimated that in selling this way saves the sheepmen about 50 cents per head. These sheep will be received in April thus saving the range. This method of selling will also bring a large amount of wool money into the country at least two months before the usual time as heretofore the annual wool sales have taken place in the latter part of June. Over 30,000 sheep have been listed in this way with the Condon National Bank.—Condon Globe.

What's an Inch of Rain?

"So you, too, don't know what an inch of rain is exactly," said the weather clerk, as he looked at his rain measuring instrument. "Very few people do, it seems. I'll explain it to you.

The pupils are all interested in their work and are diligent and orderly.

The people of this community are alive to their educational interests.
