Considerable inquiry is now coming in about Morrow county's wheat lands. We have the cheapest wheat lands in the country.

The tables showing the computation and apportionment of the total amount of revenue necessary for state purposes and equalization of assessments between the counties, furnished by the Secretary of State, have been received and filed by County Clerk Hill. The total amount of taxable property as equalized by the Morrow county board of equalization amounts to \$7,732,299.00. The state board of equalization reduced this amount to \$6,878,549.59, making our state tax \$14,662.50. Morrow county's state tax for 1908, was \$10,925.00.

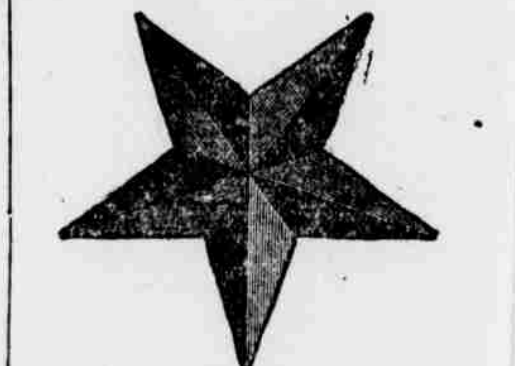
