THE DEMONSTRATION FARM.

The visit of W. M. Jardine, agronomist with dry land cereals of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and Prof. Scudder, agronomist of the Oregon Agricultural College, is now the source of much comment, both favorable and unfavorable.

Many ridiculous statements can be heard from people who have not taken or do not care to take trouble to become informed as to the actual facts, and have jumped at conclusions and have characterized the movement as a graft.

It is a well known fact that our national government is greatly interested in the improvement of agricultural conditions in the great districts of the country where the moisture is insufficient under present methods to insure safe and profitable results from agricultural pursuits, and to secure better results, the government has expended millions of dollars and will spend many millions more.

The demonstration farm idea which is only a drop in the bucket when compared with the great work of the government, nevertheless, is of considerable importance. It is a co-operative concern in which the government, the state, and the local community must unite.

The government and state have agreed to furnish \$2500 each annually. But they say if we help you you must also help yourselves.

The county is asked to furnish and equip not less than 200 acres of land on which to experiment on. This will cost about \$10,000. The county will retain the ownership of the land. The cost would be in being out of the use of this money. The increase in the value of this property would make a close stand off on interest.

But enterprising citizens are offering propositions that would increase our tax levy less than one tenth of a mill to install the demonstration farm.

Why, it is not going to throw anybody into bankruptcy.

The advertising that this farm would give Morrow county would be worth more than the cost.
