"When you were first married you said you thought heaven had sent you to me," remarked his wife. "Do you still think so?"

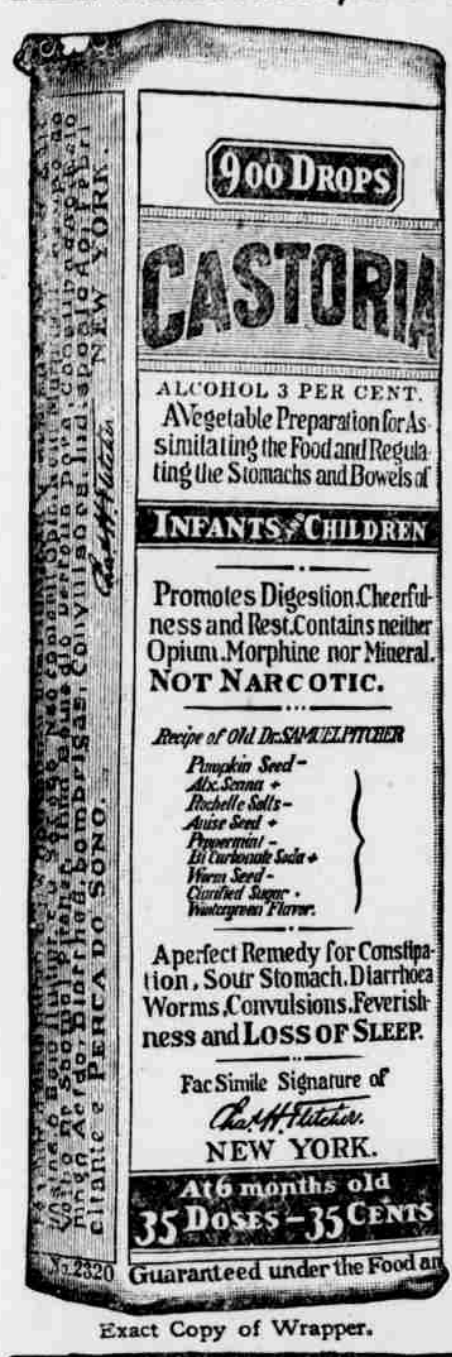

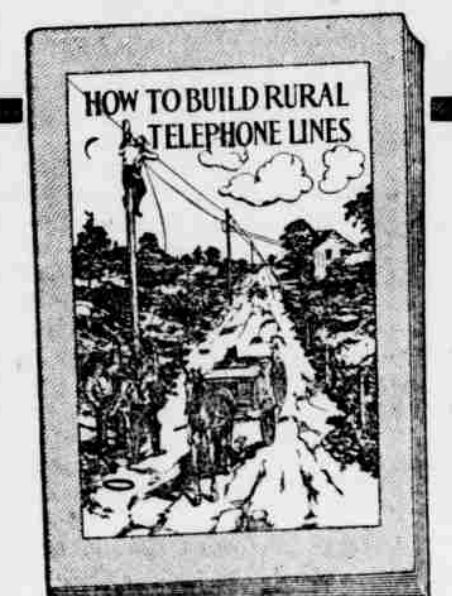

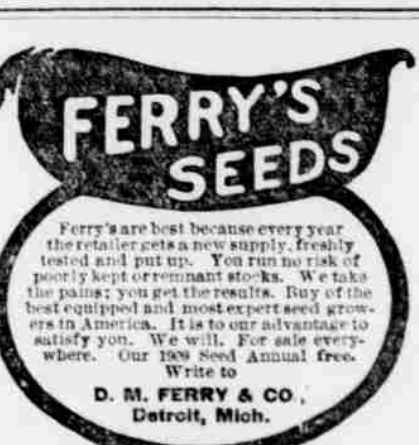
