Mr. Fuller went to Salem last Monday to pay his taxes. Going up State street toward the court house he looked across the street and recognized Davis who was on his way to the postoffice.

To be sure of the right man. Mr. Fuller shadowed Davis until he returned from the postoffice.

Evidently Davis also recognized Fuller for the crook suddenly dropped out of sight by entering a saloon. After waiting for some time Mr. Fuller saw Davis come out of the saloon and go to a hotel where he soon came out with an overcoat on his arm and headed toward the electric car station.

Fuller immediately informed the chief of police of the situation, but the officer was reluctant to act owing to the fact that Mr. Fuller was a stranger and the police knew nothing of the case and did not have a description of the man.

Sheriff Minto was called up and the sheriff only knew of the case what he had read in the papers and had no description.

The banker who cashed the \$50 check for Davis was sent for, and Davis was again located and identified by the banker as the man who had cashed the check.

The notarial seal on the Burchell deed bears the name of Norman Butler.

It appears that Davis was trying to work the same real estate game in Salem. He had ordered an abstract and had been looking at property.

Just why Davis should loiter around Salem so long after cashing a check which revealed his identity is a mystery.

Sheriff Shutt left Tuesday morning for Salem and will return this evening with the prisoner.

FINE WHEAT RANCH SOLD

Over 1000 Acres Brings Close to \$25.00 Per Acre.

W. O. Minor and Robert Thompson have purchased from Minor Bros., what is known as the Sanford place nine miles southeast of Heppner.

The farm consists of 1040 acres of land, together with horses and implements.

The consideration was \$24,200. There are now 600 acres of fine growing fall wheat on the place, besides almost 100 acres of rye.

Wheat on this place has yielded as high as 45 bushels to the acre. It is considered one of the best wheat ranches in the county.

Mr. Thompson who was formerly with Minor & Co., has already moved onto the place and will have charge of the work. He is an experienced farmer with modern ideas.

TO INCREASE WATER SUPPLY

Light and Water Company Testing Water From New Well.

The Heppner Light and Water company has been making tests during the past week from the Bellenbrock well, just south town, with a view to increasing the water supply of the city.

Pumping tests have shown a flow of from 50 to 60 gallons per minute during the day for a trial of several days.

Samples of the water have been sent away for analysis and if the returns are satisfactory, the company will siphon the water from this well to a reservoir which will add greatly to the present supply which is already becoming overtaxed by the increasing demand owing to the growth of the city.

The company has secured an option on the well and should the water prove to be good, the well will be enlarged and deepened.

The present depth of the well is not down to bedrock, and considering this fact, the great flow of water is remarkable.
