**SWINDLER DAVIS
ADMITS ALL
Ex-Convict Having Served
Time for Cattle
Stealing.**

The man known as James Davis who so cleverly obtained \$800 from the Bank of Heppner on the fake land deal is now in the Morrow county jail.

Immediately after his arrest in Salem, Davis became repentant and talked freely.

He willingly gave up \$700 in his possession and requested that the money be turned over to the bank.

Further developments have shown that Davis' real name is Dexter Roberts and his former record is a bad one.

In 1884 he was sent to the penitentiary from Umatilla county for cattle stealing. Since that time he was mixed up in a forgery case.

He signed the necessary papers to clear the title to the Burchell place and seems to be willing to do everything that he can to help straighten out his entanglements.

**WOOLGROWERS
REVISE DATES
Official Announcements
Made by Secretary
Smythe.**

The list of wool sales dates submitted by the buyers some time ago has been revised by the local wool growers to suit their convenience says the East Oregonian.

Whether the new list will suit the buyers or not is not known, but it is believed they will object to some of the changes. It is also believed that their objections will be of no avail.

The buyers asked to have the sales for Echo and Pilot Rock abandoned but the wool growers would not hear to this and have set dates for those places. They also gave Vale a date, this place having been omitted in the list submitted by the buyers, while one date less was made for Pendleton and Baker City.

Pendleton had been given two dates, May 24 and June 4, but the second date has been given to Pilot Rock. Baker had also been given two dates, June 5 and June 21. The second one has been given to Vale.

An extra date, May 29, has been given to Echo and the first Heppner date has been changed from May 25 to May 26, so as to give the buyers a chance to get to Echo.

Official announcements of these dates are now being sent out by Secretary Dan P. Smythe of the State Woolgrowers Association, and a cordial invitation is extended to all buyers and dealers to be present. The growers are urged to have their clips in the various warehouses before the dates named.

The writer visited the schools in districts No. 6 and No. 19 last week. Miss Carrie Ward is teaching in District No. 6. The school is small, only six pupils being in attendance. The furniture is good. The school is provided with a globe. The blackboard is very good, but is rather small. The school needs a dictionary. The pupils are diligent and are making very good progress in their work.

Mrs. T. C. Stephens teaches in District No. 19. The building is quite old, but is fairly comfortable. The furniture is home made. The school is provided with a globe, a good encyclopedia, a map of Oregon, and quite a number of library books. There is, also, a dictionary, but it is not very serviceable as many of the leaves are gone and the remainder of the book is almost ready to fall to pieces. Some of the windows are supplied with shades. A number of excellent mottoes and a few good pictures decorate the walls. The blackboard is fair, and the blackboard space is ample. This is also, a small school, the enrollment being nine. Sickness among the pupils has made the attendance rather irregular, but the pupils seem to be doing very good work. The people of the district are interested in their school as is evidenced by the number of names on the visitors' register.

April 23 has been designated as parents' day at the Lexington school. The patrons and friends of the school have been invited to visit the school all day. In the afternoon a special program will be rendered by the pupils, and in the evening a local educational meeting will be held at the hall.
