Editor Gazette:—On Tuesday, I visited the school in joint district No. 39. Miss Rosa L. Warner is the teacher. This is a small school, the enrollment being eight. The building is good, the furniture fair. There is ample blackboard, and most of it is of good quality. The school is provided with a map of Oregon, a globe, a physiological chart, a primary chart, and a good dictionary. The windows are equipped with shades. The pupils all seemed to be diligent and orderly in their work.

The new school laws have been received and the clerks may obtain copies by calling for them. Several districts have already been supplied.

The new law provides that the doors of all school houses shall open outward. It would be well for school boards to bear this in mind, and where changes are necessary, have the matter attended to during the vacation period.

The National Educational Association meets this year at Denver, July 5. Anyone desiring information in regard to the meeting may see me or write to me.

Prof. Wilcox and his pupils came up from Lexington, Saturday, to observe the work of the X-rays. Dr. Winnard kindly giving them a demonstration. Prof. Wilcox has been retained as principal of the Lexington school for the ensuing year.

ENLARGED HOME-STEAD ACT

Now Possible to Take up 320 Acres of Land.

The following excerpts are taken from the enlarged homestead act which was approved by Congress February 19, 1909:

The first section of the act provides for the making of homestead entry for an area of 320 acres, or less of nonmineral, nontimbered, nonirrigable public land.

The term "nonirrigable land" as used in this act, is construed to mean land which, as a rule, lacks sufficient rainfall to produce agricultural crops without the necessity of resorting to unusual methods of cultivation, such as the system commonly known as "dry farming," and for which there is no known source of water supply from which such land may be successfully irrigated at a reasonable cost.

Therefore, lands containing merchantable timber, mineral lands, and lands within a reclamation project, or lands which may be irrigated at a reasonable cost from any known source of water supply, may not be entered under this act. Minor portions of a legal subdivision susceptible of irrigation from natural sources, as, for instance, a spring, will not exclude such subdivision from entry under this act, provided, however, that no one entry shall embrace in the aggregate more than 40 acres of such irrigable lands.

Lands must be reasonably compact, not to exceed in any event 1 1/2 miles in length.

The fees are the same as under the old law.

Homestead entryman on lands coming under this act upon which final proof has not been made, may enter other contiguous lands, not to exceed 320 acres in all including original entry, and residence and cultivation of the original entry shall be accepted as equivalent to residence upon and cultivation of the additional entry, by paying the required fees.

Entrymen who made final proof on the original entries prior to the date of the act are not entitled to make additional entries under this act.

Commutation of either original or additional entry, made under this act, is expressly forbidden.
