

TWO STATIONS
RECOMMENDEDBoard of Regents at O. A.
C. Delay Selection.

Because plans developed where there is a possibility of two dry land experiment stations in Eastern Oregon, the selection for a site for the station authorized by the last legislature was not made by the board of regents of the Agricultural college at the recent meeting. Two sites are considered in the recommendations of the United States government and college experts as follows:

The Harney valley country and the great wheat belt of Sherman, Gilliam and adjoining counties. The great need of experimental work in both as expressed in the report resulted in plans by which the board hopes, by securing funds from private sources, to secure a station for both sections. The matter is to be determined at the annual meeting of the regents in July.

The report of experts shows that in the Harney district there are 1,400,000 acres of fertile semi-arid land capable of producing an enormous output of products that is as yet untouched by the plow, and that transportation and proper agricultural methods would make it a district of great wealth and importance to the state.

Believes Children Should
Go to Church.

Editor Gazette:—May I have space in your paper to make a quotation from the pen of a very gifted man and offer some comments that I think will be of much good to the readers of your most excellent paper.

Dr. Hillis, of Brooklyn, writing on the practice of letting children of seven, eight, or nine years of age decide whether they shall go to church or not says:

"The argument that children acquire an aversion to the church by being forced to 'go to meeting' by their parents is ridiculous. Children are 'forced' by their parents to all sorts of things, such as eat good food and abstain from food that is harmful, attending school and going to bed. It is not apparent that they thereby acquire an aversion for wholesome food, to sleep or to education. Nor is it a matter of observation that children who are trained up by their parents to go to church are the people, when they come to adult years, constitute the absentee class from church attendance and services. The argument is simply one of those ingenious and plausible little fictions invented by that very rabid opponent of church services, the 'father of lies.'"

We sometimes believe and fall into using expressions, that we hear others use, without giving them very much thought. I call the attention of, especially fathers and mothers to the above quotation and ask you to seriously consider the truth of the influence of letting your children form the habit of non-attendance at the church service. I have for a long time questioned if not 'the father of all lies' put it in the minds of some good people to believe that if they forced their children to attend services that they would have an aversion for the services. I am glad indeed to see the attendance at the Sunday school and the church services increasing and the boys and girls and young men and women taking more interest. I do sincerely hope that we will not be too largely influenced by some one, who perhaps wants to find an excuse for not attending, and very emphatically declares that it was because that they were compelled to go when young. If you will think for a moment you will discover the truth that they had already an inclination not to go or they would not have been compelled to go. J. PERRY CONDER.

Attorney General Crawford rendered an opinion in which he holds that butchers who sell meat from wagons do not come under the provisions of the peddler's license law, which went into effect Saturday. The law expressly exempts those who peddle farm products, and the attorney general shows that the weight of authority favors the position that beef sold either by the farmer or by the butcher is a farm product within the meaning of the law. Many inquiries regarding the new peddler's license act are being received daily and indications are that the law will be tested in the courts immediately upon its going into effect.
