



### Bluestem at Dollar.

The first of a dozen new combined harvesters purchased this season in the Lewiston country drove into a 200 acre field of barley south of Lewiston, Idaho, Thursday and began the season's run of harvesting. The grain on the lowlands is now fully matured and the harvest will be under full headway by the middle of the coming week. A week's rain has delayed the work, but it did no harm to the ripened grain, while it made the crop on the uplands, insuring more than the average yield on the largest acreage ever grown in the county.

The bluestem wheat now being cut has been largely contracted to the milling companies for \$1 a bushel and the farmers are expecting that the main crop of spring sown wheat will bring 85 cents or better. The total of the crop that will be routed through the Lewiston gateway this year is estimated at 10,000,000 bushels. Nez Perce and Camas prairies will have the largest crops ever harvested in that section, owing to the good yield and the increased acreage, and as this is the first year that the railroads have operated on the prairies they will market at least expense and get the highest returns.

### MINOR BUYS

#### FINE CATTLE

### Adds Three More Winners to His Fine Show Herd

W. O. Minor has bought College Mary, the champion cow of Kansas, of T. K. Tomson's sons, Dover, Kansas, and also two prize winning heifers of J. F. Stodder, of Burden, Kansas. The heifers bought of Mr. Stodder are Bright Star and Princess Archer, both daughters of Mr. Stodder's great bull, Captain Archer. At the great Enid show last March each of these heifers won first in class with very strong competition, 16 entries in one class and 20 in the other. Bright Star is a junior yearling and Princess Archer a senior calf. The cow, College Mary, was grand champion at Hutchinson, Kas., last fall.

Portland will have an improved market for the livestock of the Northwest in the coming month when the big stockyards on the Peninsula will be opened. It is said the new facilities to be offered for the marketing of stock will be the best on the Pacific Coast. At the start the yards will have a capacity of 75 cars, or nearly 2000 head of cattle; 10,000 head of sheep, or about 75 cars; and 4000 head, or 50 cars, of hogs. This capacity can easily be doubled as occasion requires. The yards will be run in connection with the new packing plants now being built on the Peninsula.

That the climate of the Pacific Northwest is most favorable to long life is the belief of Dr. Rudolph J. Hoague, exponent of the simple life and author of the book, "How to Live One Hundred Years." He is going to establish a colony of his followers near Vancouver, Wash., where life will be along simple lines and next to nature. Simplicity of diet and clothing will prevail. Dr. Hoague's followers will be tucked into bed at sundown and will rise with the lark. Worry and dull care will be tabooed and members of the colony will be told to be always cheerful and happy. Dr. Hoague promises all who will live after his rules a hundred years of life.

### New Upper River Steamer.

The steamer Inland Empire will be put on the run from Celilo to Lewiston on the 24th of July.

Owing to the heavy increase in the freight traffic on the upper river it has been considered necessary for some time past to place this steamer on the run opposite the steamer Twin Cities, but the difficulty of obtaining a suitable crew has held them back for the last week or two, but that difficulty has been overcome and she will be in readiness to leave Celilo on the 24th. This addition to the run will give a three-day service out of both Celilo and Lewiston and will undoubtedly be greatly appreciated by the people in those places.

The company expects to handle an exceptionally large amount of freight from now on and they are doing everything possible to handle it in the most expeditious manner possible, and it is thought that a steamer leaving the two ends every three days will accomplish all that they expect of it. Large shipments of wheat are expected to be brought down at frequent intervals, as well as the regular freight which the company's boats are called upon to handle.

### MORROW COUNTY WHEAT FIELDS

### Active Harvest Operations Now in Progress.

The wheat market continues to improve with advanced prices.

Quotations this week are: Club, 87 cents per bushel; 40-fold, 90 cents per bushel; blue stem, 94 cents per bushel.

In the Ione country harvest operations are now active. The grain is ready to harvest and about all of the machinery available is being pressed into service.

On the Hamlet ranch south of Ione, a combine is running. The yield is light and not up to expectations. The wheat on this ranch is only turning out about four bushels to the acre where a yield of from six to seven bushels was expected.

Winnard Bros. are running a combine out on the Hatt place. The yield has not been learned.

On the Sanford place, southeast of Heppner, recently purchased by W. O. Minor and Bob Thomson, a yield of 20 bushels of wheat to the acre is expected. On the same place the barley crop is exceptionally good and has every appearance of turning out barley around the 40 bushel mark to the acre.

While prices are good and buyers are offering to contract, farmers are not inclined to sell at the present time.

The first contract of the season is that of Lack McMurray, who has signed up to deliver 1000 sacks of forty-fold and turkey red wheat at Jordan Siding for 90 cents per bushel.
