Farmers have been bringing to town for the past two weeks, a great many apples. Almost any kind of fruit grows in Morrow County. More fruits and better farming methods and Morrow County will grow.

The bronco stories by Frank Harding are good and finely photographed and "The Rights and Wrongs of Childhood" by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, is a masterful composition that should not escape the parental eye.

The 7th District Fair at Pendleton, September 27 to October 2nd. Commence now to get your exhibits in shape and make preparations to attend. This year thousands of people are coming West and Pendleton is a junction for one of the big transcontinental lines, so let us give Morrow County a boost by having an exceptionally good exhibit of our resources.

Heppner, this year the main wheat market for the County, the only wool market in the County and one of the big ones of the State, has a bright prospect for Fall business. The resources are here, hence the business, and Heppner is one of the best towns in Oregon. Better roads for Morrow County and all highways leading into Heppner repaired, should be the slogan of every business man in our town.

Harvesting has commenced in earnest. On the flat above town six headers and a combine will be found running to their limit. A number of thirty-five and forty bushel crops are reported on Upper Eight Mile, and this a dry year. Morrow County is not the best county in the state and it is far from being the least productive. It is a good old steady producer and is contributing heavily to the upbuilding of other sections of the state. In the past Morrow County has been a grub stake for men to build their fortunes in other sections, but the future will be Morrow County for self.

Is any section of the country ahead of us with alfalfa? The third cutting by July 20th looks pretty good to us.—Irrigon Irrigator. Such reports sound good and we are sure that no county in the state can boast of anything better. Fine climate, good soil, and industrious farmers are the three most important factors in crop producing, and these are found in Irrigon. Let Morrow County grow.

Harney Valley is now busy exploiting gas wells. Natural gas has been known to exist in that section of Oregon for a number of years and now that a railroad is an assured fact this great industry will lead in the propaganda for a Greater Oregon. At a recent meeting of the commercial body of Burns the members fairly tell over one another to get to the front with their \$500 and \$100 donations for advertising and boosting Harney Valley another year. Here is an example that is an object lesson for more favored communities and should lend and have a tendency for the moss crusted fossils of other localities to put on the progressive robe and be up and doing with a will and a way that will place their county in the column of progression. This lesson can find fertile fields in Morrow County.
