Irrigation along our creek bottoms is what we need at the present time. Let us all put forth a supreme effort to conserve the present supply of water.

Mr. Farmer, build dams at the mouth of your worthless draws and ravines. Catch the water that goes to waste. Grow garden and truck patches, these help to pay the grocery bill.

Commence now to get your exhibits ready for the Fair at Pendleton. Send in your exhibits to D. C. Gardane and give him your assistance. Put Morrow County to the front with a show of her wonderful resources. Let Morrow County grow.

Now Hill has jumped the river and landed square in Harriman's territory. Good, but it is too bad that he did not bump years ago. The people of interior Oregon now have a chance to get out with their produce and the Deschutes railroad will lend them the way before snow falls again.

The Gazette is in receipt of the 48th annual catalogue of the Oregon State Fair to be held in Salem, September 13-18. The 1909 meeting promises to be the most interesting in the history of the association. Fifteen thousand dollars will be given in premiums on livestock, agricultural and manufactured products.

There is not enough water in any of our creeks to give each rancher the needed amount and under the system now being installed the bringing of new land under the ditch is next to impossible. Ranchers who are on deep soil should irrigate every day of the winter and spring that is possible and in the meantime lend every effort within their power toward the construction of reservoirs.

No less than 25,668,670 people throughout the United States will have their attention drawn to Oregon as the land of opportunity during the coming three months by a great advertising campaign to be conducted by the Portland Commercial Club. The leading agricultural papers and the weekly editions of the big dailies will be used. There is no question that the campaign will direct the movement of thousands of people to this state.

The advertisement will carry the familiar oval, with the slogan, "Oregon is the Place for You," in large letters, and those at all interested are urged to ask for literature and information about Oregon. The advertisement informs the reader that railroad rates are the same to all parts of Oregon from the East and Oregon commercial bodies will be supplied with addresses of all enquirers so that the whole state may profit by this advertising, although Portland will bear all the expense. There is probably no other city in the world that has done a like thing.

Conservation is the live topic for discussion in the new West. It contemplates the inauguration of a general campaign for better use of the gifts of nature. It means a proper knowledge of all that contributes to the health and comfort of the human family. It is a question which must be handled by practical men engaged in utilizing the natural resources of land and sea. The work calls for the combined assistance of producer and consumer to insure protection to the products of the earth that go to make up the prosperity of the Nation. It concerns the happiness of individuals and the progress of the whole country.

The quartermaster-general has issued new specifications for the cotton uniform of the United States army. As is well known, the cotton service cloth has heretofore been dyed a yellowish-brown shade, universally known as khaki. The new requirements provide a brown warp and a green filling, producing thereby an olive tone similar to the color of the woolen uniform cloth. The new cloth will be of lighter weight than the old khaki.

Horticulturists, farmers, stockmen and merchants should heed the advice of President Roosevelt, of the fair board, and make ready to maintain exhibits at the coming district fair. The fair is for the benefit of all the people of Umatilla and Morrow counties. Help make it a success.

CONSERVE THE WATER.

The conservation of our natural resources is an all absorbing topic, and is receiving some consideration from nearly every thinking citizen. Irrigation is perhaps the most popular of these subjects for the reason that it will be through this method that the vast arid portions of this state will be brought under the plow.

Morrow county has many thousands of acres of arid land and much of it is an exceptional situation for the putting of water on it and some day when the country around us has been settled this land will be redeemed. Immigration is not sufficient at the present to bring about any great enterprise, like the John Day project, but the time is here

when the water from our creeks should be saved and must be saved. Every spring there is enough water flowing down our water sources, going to waste, to furnish the ranchers sufficiently and to bring every foot of tillable land adjacent to these streams under the ditch. The solution of this problem is to build reservoirs and store the water that flows down to the Columbia to be swallowed up by the Pacific Ocean after a mad rush of idleness.

On Willow creek there are numerous feasible dam sites where reservoirs could be built at small expense, and the same can be said of Rhea creek. These propositions should be handled by the federal government or perhaps better by the state and it is to this end our ranchers should begin at once to work.

Give us more water and not the stingy apportionment of a dry creek. Give us more water and it is then our produce will force its way to the markets. Give us more water and you will see our diversified farms springing into state fame, and perhaps national, and, finally, give us more water, then Morrow County on the map and a Greater Oregon.
