### A Sad Death.

One of the saddest deaths occurring in Heppner for some years was that of the young wife of Charles M. Hall, nee Olive Adkins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Adkins. Mrs. Hall was ill in all only about six months, during which time she with her husband moved from Ellensburg, Wash., on account of her health, and came back to Morrow County to her father's home thinking the change would be beneficial to her health. But her complaint was too deeply set and she sank rapidly, passing out of this life on the day of her birth, July 23, 1909, being 24 years of age.

Mrs. Hall was a member of the M. E. Church, South, at Walls Walls, having joined the church when but eleven years old. From young girlhood she was exceedingly conscientious in all things, which trait joined to her ever pleasant, joyous, agreeable disposition made her a most lovable character.

This death breaks the circle for the first time in Brother Adkins' family and is therefore felt all the keener by the family as also by a host of friends. During her last days after being told she could no longer live, she showed remarkable Christian resignation and trust. Instead of the news being a shock to her she spoke of a weight being gone and expressed a joy of being so close to the Saviour in whom she had confided her young life. While she expressed a keen regret to leave a loving husband and her own family, yet her constant prayer was for the release that came on the day of her birth.

After only a prayer, a scripture reading and a song by the writer, her remains were tenderly borne to the depot and shipped to Milton, Oregon, where the funeral proper and interment took place, conducted by Rev. C. R. Howard of Walls Walls. Her request was thus fulfilled to rest by the side of her infant child who had preceded her some months, until awakened by the trumpet of God, summoning the family to a reunion on high.
