Sheep Killed.

On Monday night of this week some masked men shot into J. A. Crisman's sheep on the head of Eightmile about six miles beyond Ritter and killed about 100 head and wounded about 150 more, according to a report brought to Ritter Tuesday morning by Archie Chrisman who is tending camp for the band.

Price Crisman is herding the band and, according to his story of the affair about 9 p. m., some masked men came to his camp, routed him out of bed and told him to get out. He needed no second invitation, but immediately started on the run for the brush where he concealed himself while his nocturnal visitors supposedly five in number, were shooting into the sheep, with the above results.

The range where the band was grazing is, and has been for years, claimed as cattle range by the settlers in that neighborhood, and no doubt the shooting is the outcome of the sheepmen's encroachment on this forbidden range. There is no clue as to who did the shooting.

It is also reported that after shooting Crisman's sheep the same parties went by J. W. Miller's camp in that vicinity and fired several shots into his tent. The

report is that he had been warned to move out within 24 hours and as he had not complied it is supposed that the shots were fired to show that he meant business.—Long Creek Ranger.
