RE-OPENING OF M. E. CHURCH

The Ceremonies were Interesting and Impressive.

Saturday, September 26, was a day of days in church circles in Heppner, not for sadness, but for gladness and rejoicing.

A new Methodist Episcopal church had been built out of the old church, and was reopened Sunday. The day was a perfect fall day. Expectation for the services was at high pitch. Faith and sacrifice and hard work were back of the enterprise of enlarging and improving the church edifice. One so well acquainted with the situation a year ago as the writer can scarcely conceive how such a work could have been accomplished under a leader less energetic and less wise and far seeing in his plans and methods than the present pastor, the Rev. W. L. Airheart.

Two thousand dollars had been expended. That meant the lifting up of the church and placing under it a nice convenient basement. This will be used in the Sunday school work and for social functions. The auditorium was rearranged and beautified, new pulpit, rostrum and choir stand put in, also elegant study. Fine and pretty carpeting cover the pulpit and altar floors, while a rich rug, the gift of two friends to the pastor, personally, adds to the beauty and comfort of the study. The lighting of the church is soft and pleasant.

Of the \$2,000 used in the improvements the membership of the church had raised about \$1,000, the other thousand was procured by a loan running two years.

For the services the church was tastefully decorated with lovely flowers.

The splendid choir was well prepared, extra choirs were in readiness and polite ushers were in their places.

Wide and intense interest centered in the morning service not only in the fact of the successful culmination of a really great undertaking and the reopening of the new, truly beautiful temple of worship, but also in the fact that the Rev. Henry I. Rasmus, D.D., pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, Spokane, was the preacher of the hour.

Dr. Rasmus was appointed to this charge the second year of his ministry and was the pastor for four years. Under his labors the church which was re-opened Sunday was originally built. Nineteen years had gone by since the Doctor's pastorate here terminated. Many old friends and acquaintances were present to greet him, and many new friends were made.

In his sermon Dr. Rasmus was at his best, and is not that to say enough? Beautiful, eloquent, powerful.

Then he thought some money ought to be raised and asked for \$500 for further improvements and incidentals and promptly received \$629.07.

At the afternoon hour the Rev. Walton Skipworth, D. D., occupied the pulpit. He gave a scholarly and critical exegesis of a very difficult passage of scripture and ended with a splendid and practical appeal.

In the evening, Bishop Paddock, of the Protestant Episcopal church delivered a broad and chaste address. Congregations filled the house.

The music furnished by the choir was all that could be asked, not over done, but fitting and beautiful.

The quarterly conference the Saturday evening before increased the pastor's support for this year \$100.

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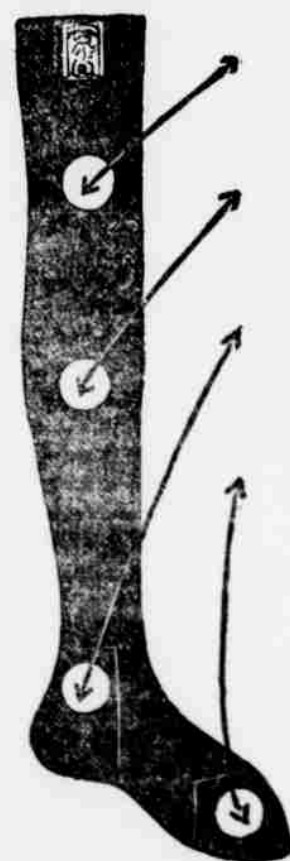
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
