New Stock Yards.

What will be the largest and best arranged stock yards in Eastern Oregon has been strated in Standfield. Last Saturday about sixty horses and a big force of men began work on the new stock yards near the depot and the work will be rushed to completion without delay. These will be the largest stock yards in Umatilla county, occupying three thousand feet of side track which indicates that Standfield is to be a shipping point of no little importance. The warehouse which has stood on the ground for several years, will be removed to make room. A distinct feature of the new yards will be a new innovation in the loading chute, which will be so constructed to admit of loading or un-loading two cars at once, thus facilitat-ing the work greatly.
