Mr. and Mrs. Ed Farnsworth, of Lower Willow creek, were in the city the first of the week.

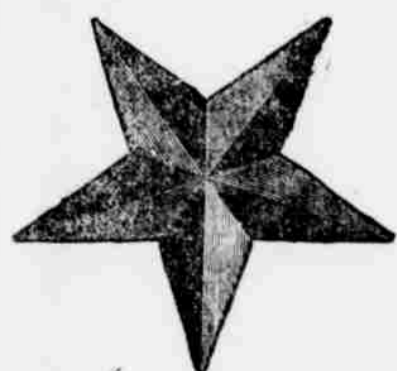
