That the Czar of Russia will have a royal orchard in Southern Oregon is the information given out by two nobles of his court, Anton Petroskovich and Peter Peterhof, who have just completed an inspection of the Pacific Northwest to locate an orchard. They decided to recommend the Rogue River Valley and are expected to close negotiations just made for a tract near Medford.

Reductions in grain rates of about 12 1/2 per cent from the interior to tidewater will go into effect on the rail roads of the Northwest on November 1, and will effect a very large saving to the wheat growers of the Inland Empire. The reduction was ordered on the O. R. & N. lines by the Oregon Railroad Commission and on the Washington railroads by the commission of that state. On the present year's crop it is believed a saving of about \$300,000 will be realized to growers by the lessened freight rates.

### Money on Small Farms.

What can a man do on 10 acres? is being answered right along. Possibly not on 10 acres outside of the Oregon country, for elsewhere all conditions are not favorable.

Four years ago Weston Allen, a workman in the car shops of the Northern Pacific Railroad company at Tacoma, Wash., where he received \$4 a day because the owner involuntarily of five acres of Yakima fruit land in the neighborhood of Sunny-side, and through the immortality of his wife he abandoned his trade to become a farmer in a small way. He had acquired the land by loaning the money necessary to buy it to the man who originally purchased it, says a Yakima paper. Mr. Allen confessed that he quit his trade with much doubt and reluctance, because he feared that five acres would not make a farm sufficient to support his family.

While in the city recently making his purchases for the season, Mr. Allen confided to a friend that he had made this year a little over \$200 from three acres of fruit on his five-acre farm, devoting the other two acres to house room, chicken run, barn and garden. "I was never more surprised in my life," said Mr. Allen, "than when I discovered, even last year, that five acres of fruit land would make any family a nice, self-sustaining home, and that the task of taking proper care of it is a snap. Why, I can do better than when I received from \$4 to \$4.50 a day without any investment at all, and then have plenty of time to enjoy life as I go along. This year I have more than \$6 a day as net profit on my work—and at times I was really ashamed of myself for taking life so easy."

"I will add 40 acres to my farm this year, if I succeed in making the deal for an adjoining tract. If not there, I will buy 10 acre somewhere else in the valley and develop it; then sell or lease the one I have now. My peach and apple trees averaged me about \$30 a tree and it cost me less than \$8 to take care of them and market their product. I charged all of my work and farm expenses against the fruit trees, but I raised a very nice garden and had vegetables to sell. My chickens, to which Mrs. Allen devoted her time successfully, turned in a handsome profit. I raised six pigs to marketable hoghood and sold four of them. I keep a cow and a horse, and yet, outside of the things sold from my garden and the henery, I made over \$200 clear a year. The orchard will do better than that next year, if conditions are equally as good."

"I have succeeded in interesting a number of my former neighbors in Tacoma, of whom over 100 worked in the Northern Pacific cashops. Many of them will be here next year, a few of them having already come and investigated for themselves. Every one of them has been pleased with the situation; two of them bought 10 acres each and the others will arrange their affairs to enable them to do likewise early in the spring. "It beats working for wages at any trade. And then one owns his home and it is becoming more valuable all the time."

### People Once Lived at the North Pole.

Neither Cook nor Peary was the first man to reach the north pole—nor the second—nor the 10,000th man.

This is the surprising theory upheld by Robert M. La Follette, senator from Wisconsin. Here is an editorial opinion advanced by La Follette's Magazine, of which he is editor:

"The real facts about the discovery of the pole are sure to come out. There can be no harm, therefore, in our stating them now. Far be it from us to cast an additional fly into the dubious pot of arctic ointment, and it is in no spirit of captiousness that we suggest that as a matter of hard pre-historic fact, the pole was very well known and frequently visited in the remote, unCooked, non-Pearvized ages of the past.

"The earth we beg to remind the public, is merely a lump of matter, once hot, and now cooling at the poles. Life first appeared at the pole, for the simple reason that everywhere else it was scalded or frizzled on sight. When man appeared, he sweltered at the pole, that being the only place where he could live, even by sweltering. As society developed, its center was naturally nearest the pole, where it was cool.

"After a while the tropical regions of Alaska and Labrador were the seats of empire, while the pole had become a summer resort. It was a ducking ground and hunting region long after that, and with a million years or so of this present year must have been a good agricultural and lumbering region.

"There would really seem to be no reason for heart-burnings, in addition to the inevitable chilblains incident to the matter, over who in this age first revisited this ancient haunt of our forefathers—what we may call our old polar home."




