National Forests.

Division of Grazing Areas Between Cattle and Sheep in Forest Reserves

WHEREAS, it has come to the attention of this Association that within certain National Forests of the State of Oregon there is unequal division of the grazing areas allotted to sheep and the grazing areas allotted to cattle and horses; that in certain instances where a fair, equal division was made between cattle grazing areas and sheep grazing areas in previous years, by the Forest officials, the said cattlemen grazing said areas have either gone out of the cattle business or otherwise disposed of their stock so that a large reduction has been made in the number of stock grazed on certain cattle and horse ranges in the National Forests of the state, and, at the same time, the Forest officials have deemed it expedient to make further cuts on adjacent sheep grazing areas for the reason there was not sufficient forage to properly support these animals. We would most respectfully recommend that Forest officials give these matters their special consideration and again equalize the grazing areas between cattle and sheep and not make the large reductions in the number of sheep to be grazed on said forests which have heretofore been contemplated.

Forest Reserves—Elimination of Untimbered Lands.

WHEREAS, it has been recommended to eliminate certain tracts of land from the boundaries of the National Forests of Oregon, and especially Township 10, South of Range 32, E. W. M., in the Umatilla National Forest, which lands are fully timbered, in fact are more so than are other parts of the National Forests; and WHEREAS, the reasons given for the elimination of certain lands are that a part of said lands are deeded lands and owned by private individuals and are, therefore, hard for the Government officials to handle; and WHEREAS, we believe in the principle of the preservation of our National Forests for future generations and are not opposed to the Forestry policy in their endeavor to protect the forest lands from being destroyed of their timbered wealth; We Therefore Recommend, that before eliminating the fully timbered lands within the National Forests, the Government officials first eliminate lands within said forests which are not timbered or which are sparsely timbered.

We Therefore Recommend, that a careful examination be made of the National Forests in Oregon and eliminations be made looking rather to the preservation of the forests than to the control of stock grazing areas. We believe the act of Congress creating the forest service contemplated the preservation of the forests for future generations rather than the control of the public lands for grazing purposes.
