Figures furnished by the Harriman lines show that they handled 70 per cent more colonist travel in 1909 than in the previous year. During the 90 days that the colonist rates were in force in the spring and fall, last year, they sold 31,476 tickets from east of the Mississippi river to western points. Of this number, 18,256 came to the Northwest. The Harriman lines are perfecting plans now to bring in an even greater number of settlers during the year 1910.

It is said work is about to be resumed on the Southern Pacific line from Drain and the Northern Pacific is said to be negotiating for big coal holdings, which lie close to Marshfield.

Wool growers of the country will gather at Portland in 1911, bringing to that city a convention representative of a great industry. Delegates to the recent convention of the wool men at Ogden from the Pacific Northwest were a uni for Portland as the next meeting place and they captured the gathering without serious opposition. Ninety per cent of the wool growers of the country are members of the organization and the convention will bring thousands of visitors to Portland. The next meeting of the national body will be held in January 1911.
