IN THE MATTER OF THE DETERMINATION OF THE RELATIVE RIGHTS TO THE WATERS OF THE UMATILLA RIVER AND ITS TRIBUTARIES, SAID MIN. WATER TRIBUTARIES BEING A TRIBUTARY OF THE COLUMBIA RIVER.

To all whom it may concern:

In the Name of the State of Oregon: You and each of you are hereby notified that the State Engineer of the State of Oregon will begin the investigation of the flow of that certain stream, and the tributaries thereof, known as the Umatilla River, in Umatilla and Morrow Counties, Oregon, together with the ditches diverting water therefrom, on Monday, the 9th day of May, 1910, pursuant to a petition heretofore filed with the Board of Control of the State of Oregon requesting a determination of the relative rights of the various claimants to the waters of said stream and its tributaries and those owning or being in possession of lands bordering on said stream or the tributaries thereof and having access thereto; and you are hereby further notified that the Superintendent of Water Division No. 2, of the State of Oregon, will commence the taking of testimony as to the relative rights of the various parties claiming water from said stream or any of its tributaries as follows, to wit:

On Monday, the 16th day of May, A. D. 1910, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. in that certain building known as the City Hall, in the town of Echo, Umatilla County, Oregon; and on Thursday, the 19th day of May, 1910, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. in the Circuit Court room, in the County Courthouse, in the City of Pendleton, Umatilla County, Oregon.
