HIGH COST OF LIVING.

The high cost of living is a serious problem with the private citizen and with the hotel and restaurant man it is becoming almost unbearable.

Here in Heppner, notwithstanding the gradual increase in the price of all food stuffs, the proverbial 25 cent square meal has reigned supreme, while all other towns have been raising on the cost of meals.

With beef on the block at 12c to 18c, mutton 18c, pork a close second, hams 26c, bacon 30c, lard 19c, flour \$1.45 for a 50 pound sack, butter 80 cents a roll and fruits and vegetables with a silvery flavor, it is not hard to figure out where the profits go on a 25 cent meal.

But the restaurant business here rests upon a basis, that is to say the least, unusual.

Whenever the public meets the oriental on an equal basis with a white man, at that moment every white man in competition gets full realization of the "yellow peril." There is nothing to it.

One good white citizen was forced to close his restaurant not long ago.

How much have the orientals invested here. How much have they helped to build up the town and county. Where does their money go?

In another column of this paper a notice appears stating that the price of meals will be raised to 35 cents at the Palace hotel.

The Gazette has no more interest in the hotel than in any other business house in the town, but we are interested in the success of Heppner's business men.

Neither do we attempt to claim the right to even question the privilege of a single individual in where they shall spend their money, but we do claim that people who have located here and have invested \$35,000 in a business enterprise, not only from a business standpoint, but from justice and fairness should be entitled to support and encouragement.

April Fooling.

The origin of the custom of April fooling cannot be traced with any degree of certainty.
