John A. Thompson.

John A. Thompson, a Morrow county pioneer, died at his home in Portland, last Monday. The remains were shipped to this city. The funeral occurred at the Heppner cemetery yesterday, a large number of old time friends and acquaintances attending the last sad rites.

John A. Thompson was born January 1, 1835, in Franklin county, Missouri. In 1853, with his parents he crossed the plains with ox teams, settling near Eugene.

He was a veteran of the Rogue river Indian wars. After the Indian troubles he engaged in mining and packing, going to the John Day country in 1862, afterward going to the Blackfoot country where he mined and prospected for two years. Returning to the Willamette valley he bought and sold stock and farmed until 1877, when he came to Umatilla county and located on Hinton creek.

He retired from active business in 1900.

He was married to Miss Mary B Infield, November 23, 1871.

His wife and one son survive him.
