Encouragement for Bill.

Washington, May 6.—The prospects for a postal savings bank bill of some sort are improving. For four days the House committee on post-offices and post roads, has been hearing an informal discussion of the bill, and it is said that from the great variety and volume of views expressed, there is beginning to appear a possible ground for agreement. Just what this basis may be it is not yet easy to predict.

The bill introduced by Representative Gardner (Rep., N. J.) which provides for the deposit of postal savings funds in National Banks, to be withdrawn whenever \$2,000,000 are accumulated and invested in Government securities, is said to be favorably regarded by a number of the committee.

A proposal to have Government bonds issued in small denominations, which may be purchased by postal savings depositors, is also said to be meeting with some favor. It is also suggested that the Government issue bonds in denominations as low as \$25 and sell them to individual purchasers. According to information from the committee, it is not unlikely that a mutual ground may be reached and a bill reported from committee within the next two weeks. The views of the members of the House generally are of great and divergent variety and any bill which the committee may report is sure, it is said, to prove unsatisfactory to a large proportion of the membership.

High Prices for Jerseys.

Dr. S. W. McClure, chief of the Bureau of animal industry in the northwest, has just returned from Snappose, Oregon, where he attended the big auction sale of the famous Harry West herd of Jerseys. Dr. McClure says it was the greatest sale of the kind ever held in the country and he believes it will result in the development of the dairy industry of the northwest in that several men secured the nucleus of good herds whereas the animals were all owned by one man before.

Eighty head of cattle, ranging in age from one day up, were sold and the prices ranged from \$60 to \$1000. The average price was \$227. The best bull sold for \$1000; the best cow for \$805 and eleven head for more than \$500 each. All those over one year of age brought an average price of \$357, while a one-day-old calf brought the remarkable price of \$60. According to Dr. McClure, one of the best features of the sale was the fact that most of the animals will remain in Oregon. Of the entire number, only 18 go to California or Washington, the rest all remaining in this state.

The day before, the doctor attended a similar sale at Newberg, Oregon. Fifty head of Jerseys, belonging to Gordon, were sold at that sale for the average price of \$164 per head.
