Will Stand by Ballinger.

Washington, May 20.—President Taft told several callers today he intends to stand by Secretary Ballinger for he is convinced of Mr. Ballinger's innocence either of wrongdoing or of improper motives. The President says he does not consider that Ballinger's accusers have made out any case against him.

On top of this announcement from the White House comes the reiteration of Secretary Ballinger's purpose to hold on to his position, notwithstanding a renewal of the reports in friendly papers that he is soon to resign.

With all the testimony before it that was to be presented, the Ballinger-Pinchot investigating committee today took steps to bring to a speedy conclusion the Congressional inquiry that has been in progress four months.

Two days this week—Friday and Saturday—have been allotted to the lawyers to make their closing arguments. Then the public hearings will end and the attorneys will have fifteen days in which to submit briefs, after which the committee will bring legislative sessions to weigh the evidence.

The "prosecution," as the Pinchot side of the controversy is called, began the presentation of evidence January 26 and concluded March 18. Since that time the committee has been hearing the Ballinger "defense."

Both sides still have opportunity to add to the already bulky records, papers and affidavits of a certain character.

Attorney Vertrees counsel for Ballinger, today put in the agreements between L. R. Glavis and W. W. Barr, a land broker of Seattle, to show Glavis had a pecuniary interest in obtaining timber lands from the Government. It was the avowed purpose of the "defense" to show in this matter Glavis' information

obtained while in the employ of the Government.

Portions of the testimony at the trial of the Cunningham coal land cases also were presented by Mr. Vertrees, who said it showed Glavis and Special Agent Jones knew there was nothing in the charge that the Guggenheims were planning to get control of the Cunningham claims when they took the affidavits of the Cunningham claimants, and that Glavis and Jones deceived the claimants.

Oregon Trunk Railway.

Salem, Or., May 20.—In supplemental articles of incorporation filed today in the office of the Secretary of State, the Oregon Trunk Railway Company declares its intention to build up the Valley of the Deschutes River and its tributaries, and in a general southerly direction, to a point at or near Klamath Falls, in the State of Oregon; and also from a point on the main line of the railway of the said corporation in township 35 south, range 7 east, of the Willamette meridian, in Klamath County, Oregon, to a point in the City of Medford, Jackson County, Oregon, a distance of about 70 miles, with such branches and extensions as the corporation may hereafter decide upon.

This decision was taken at a meeting of the trustees held in Vancouver, Wash., May 11, 1910, and ratified by a unanimous vote at a meeting of the stockholders held the same day, at which 49,999 shares—being all but one share—of the stock of the corporation were represented.

Withdrawals of John Day.

Washington, May 21.—Temporary withdrawals from the public domain for power sites were made by Secretary Ballinger today of approximately 2440 acres along the John Day River, in Oregon; 5547 acres along the Wind River, in Wyoming; 8620 acres along the Price River, in Utah, and 606 acres along the Blue River, in Colorado. Large tracts of land in Montana and New Mexico were designated for settlement under the enlarged homestead act.

About 69,130 acres in the former state were placed within the terms of that act and approximately 57,630 acres in the latter were so designated as not being susceptible of successful irrigation at a reasonable cost from

any known source of water supply.

An aggregate of nearly 100,000 acres have been thrown out of National forests in Oregon and added to the unreserved public domain by the latest proclamations issued by the President in carrying out the plan recently adopted for rearranging the forest boundary lines.

The following shows the total eliminations from each of four National forests in that state. Malheur, 4485 acres; Whitman, 61,756; Deschutes, 6152, and Umatilla, 69,518.

The total eliminations in the entire country amount to 791,714 acres, and the total additions to National forests aggregate 199,008 acres.

Gathering Information.

Because eastern railway agents do more than any other set of men to direct new settlers into the western states, and because many of them possess only second hand information about the country which they describe many times each day to prospective home-seekers and tourists, the Great Northern railway has hit upon a plan of sending its eastern agents in pairs on visits to the northwest, and during the past week S. Lounsbury, city passenger agent for the G. N. in New York City, and G. M. Orabell of Boston, have been visitors in Seattle. They will be followed this week by George Eighmy and L. D. Ketchell, the railroad's agents in Buffalo and Pittsburg, respectively. Other eastern agents will come later. W. A. Ross, assistant general passenger agent of the Great Northern, is seeing that the eastern men get a thorough knowledge of the western liners of the Great Northern, and of the country in general. When they return to their posts they will be primed with first hand data concerning the Northwest states and their opportunities for the homeseeker. Their conversation will no longer consist of glittering generalities, but they will know just how apples are grown in this section, and wheat in that, and whatever else the interested easterner wants to know. The western railroads are making every effort to attract new people into the country they serve, and in giving its agents a trip through the west, the Great Northern thinks it is making a profitable investment that will help draw many a new settler.
