

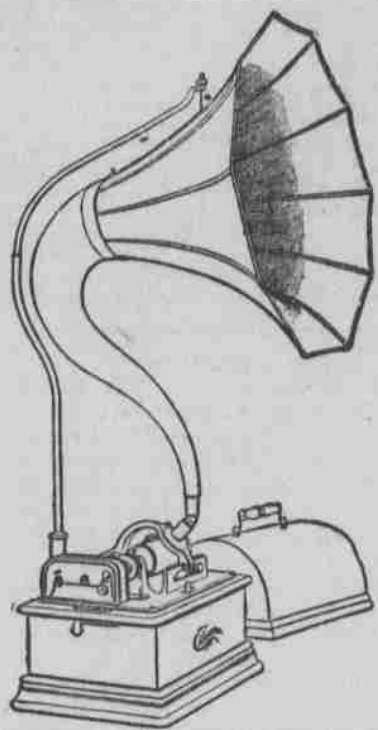

CONGRESS CLOSES BUSY SESSION

President is Congratulated by Cabinet and Members.

Washington, June 25.—President Taft walked out of the Capitol at 11 o'clock tonight smiling.

The second session of the 61st Congress had just adjourned and he had signed practically all matters of legislation that had been placed before him. He received congratulations from his Cabinet and from members of both branches of Congress upon the successful passage of most of his pet measures. Mr. Taft shook hands all around and continued to smile.

The last measure signed was a joint resolution to authorize the Secretary of War to lend tents to the Appalachian exposition to be held in Knoxville, Tenn., in September, which Mr. Taft expects to attend.

Each house of Congress marked its closing hours by voting for an investigation of the McMurray Indian contracts. Instead of the usual scene of comparatively undignified relaxation from the business of legislation, both houses devoted exceedingly serious attention to the charges of bribery attempted and other forms of improper influence made in the Senate yesterday by Senator Gore of Oklahoma, and subsequently in the House by Representative Murphy of Missouri.

Two separate investigations are provided for, one in each house. Each body passed a resolution creating a select committee of five members to pursue the inquiry to the bottom during the recess of Congress, and to report whether any of its members are, or have been, interested in any of these contracts.

Until a late hour today it looked rather as if the matter would go by default, but as soon as the two houses reconvened at 9 o'clock tonight, after a recess since afternoon, the subject came up with a rush and crowded galleries listened with intense interest to the proceedings which ended in the vote to probe the charges.

In adjourning the House, Speaker Cannon made a brief statement in which he said that he held no malice toward anyone and hoped that all would have a pleasant vacation.

More than a billion dollars was appropriated at the present session of Congress, if continuing appropriations are incorporated in the totals of the general appropriation measures.

Definite figures concerning the appropriations will be issued from the House and Senate committees within a few days.

Insofar as the figures could be obtained from measures which underwent changes in the last hours of the session, the total of these appropriations exclusive of continuing appropriations, was \$894,086,943.

The amount of the continuing appropriations for the last fiscal year was about \$160,000,000. It is safe to say that it will not be less for the next fiscal year, and the grand total therefore will aggregate at least \$1,054,000,000.

The appropriation measures for the fiscal years 1909-10, exclusive of continuing appropriations, carried \$883,918,215, while those of the fiscal year of 1908-09 carried \$854,203,248.

The boasts of Congressional leaders that fully \$50,000,000 would be saved in the appropriations for the next fiscal year were not realized.

To be Placed on Market.

Portland, Or., June 28.—The old Dalles military wagon road grant is about to be placed on the market and this land, together with the Willamette Valley & Cascade Mountain road grant that is to be sold in small tracts, will mean a great colonization movement for Oregon during the coming few years. The Dalles grant comprises 430,000 acres and is very largely valuable agricultural land. Its settlement will mean a great increase in the state's population and wealth.

The Pacific Power & Light company organized by Eastern capitalists with a capitalization of \$7,500,000, plans to develop a great electrical generating and distributing system throughout the Yakima, Columbia and Walla Walla valleys. Other concerns have been taken over by the big corporation, which will give special attention to furnish power for irrigation work throughout the territory covered. It is promised that by concentrating the water power development in the Northwest, a more satisfactory service will be developed than can be rendered by private companies.

Uncle Sam is counting his timber wealth on the slopes of the Cascade Mountains. Export timber cruisers in the employ of the Government are at work making the estimate and it is expected it will take all this Summer and next to complete the cruise of the water shed of the Willamette River and its tributaries in the Cascade Reserve. The land will be classified and the timber segregated into logging units. This is the first attempt, so far as known, of the Government to take an inventory of its timber resources.

Japanese War Talk.

London.—Grearde Fiennes, an English naval expert, is trying his best to make Americans understand that it probably will not be long before they will have to fight Japan. "There are a hundred indications," says he in an article just published in the London Graphic, "which show that a collision between Japanese and the United States is approaching. The Americans live in a fool's paradise in this matter. The Japanese are full of contempt for American brag and bunco, for the lack of national spirit, or even of true nationality. They have profound disbelief in the war worthiness of the American navy and an acute realization of the fact that the strategic situation is overwhelmingly in their favor."

"It is held that the Japanese are too poor to fight. When will people realize the fact which all history teaches—that it is the poor nations which fight? Japan is rich enough to afford war, because, directly or indirectly, she will make war pay for itself. Japan will fight very much for the same reason that prompted Bismark to fight France. The war will be for the concentration of the yellow peoples. The Chinese dislike force but readily yield to the fear of it. Japan has beaten the most aggressive of the white powers already; victorious over another, she will appear to her huge neighbor invincible."

"Europe is not going to lift a finger, I imagine, when war breaks out between Japan and the United States, to save the latter the islands of which they deprived Spain. Europe has a 'Monroe doctrine' of its own, and it includes the determination to let the United States stew in her own juice."

BRIGHT FOR IRRIGATION BILL

Agreement Reached by Conference Com- mittee.

Washington, June 24.—There is every indication that the \$20,000,000 irrigation bill will become law tomorrow. The conference committee reached an unexpected agreement tonight on the one provision in dispute, the Army engineer clause, and its report was promptly agreed to by the Senate. It will be submitted to and approved by the House in ample time tomorrow to permit the President to sign the bill before night.

This result is highly gratifying to those who have labored unceasingly in behalf of this measure, for at one time today it looked as though the bill would be left in conference and go over until short session next December.

Senator Hale announced on the floor of the Senate this afternoon that Congress probably would adjourn tomorrow. Senator Borah interjected the remark that Hale might find it impossible to adjourn so soon. When asked to take the Senate into his confidence, Borah explained that unless there was an agreement of the conference committee on the irrigation bill, there could and would be no adjournment.

In this sentiment Senator Jones acquiesced, for Jones, Borah, Heyburn, Hughes, Southerland, Carter and Smoot had agreed among themselves not to accept the provision of the House bill which prohibited the expenditure of any part of the \$20,000,000 on any project until it was approved by a board of Army engineers.

Had it been necessary for these Senators to stand out against the conference committee, the majority in Congress might have forced adjournment, leaving this bill undisposed of for a comparatively small percentage of Senators are sufficiently interested in this legislation to stay here and fight it out.

While this colloquy was taking place in the Senate, the conference committee was at the White House endeavoring with the President's aid to reach agreement, but they were unsuccessful, Payne and Dalzell refusing to depart one iota from the terms of the House bill. The Senate conferees continued to oppose turning over the work of examinations to the Army engineers, on the ground that many of the projects had been developed to a point where they must be continued according to the original plans or all of the money already expended would be lost.

The President had the conferees as his guests at luncheon in an effort to harmonize the differences. Those who stayed were Senators Lodge, Bissley and Smoot and Representatives Payne, Clarke and Dalzell. Even this failed, however.

When the conferees returned empty-handed to the Capitol and it was noised about that adjournment might be indefinitely postponed on account of this one bill, there was another meeting, and a compromise was reached, under which projects require only the approval of the President in order that they may receive allotments from the \$20,000,000 fund. The President under the compromise is however, authorized to employ an Army board to report upon all projects concerning whose feasibility there is question.

This compromise was acceptable to the Western Senators, and when reported to the Senate was agreed to promptly.

As the compromise reached tonight is acceptable to the President, the House undoubtedly will adopt it. The President today assured the conference committee that there would be no unnecessary delay in applying the money made available by this bill, but that all possible expedition would be used in completing those projects which are worthy and practicable. He specifically stated that the projects of Washington, Idaho and Colorado were all right, and intimated that they would be among the first to receive allotments.

School Notes.

On the 15 inst., I visited the school in District No. 34, which is under the direction of Miss Margaret Osten. Twelve pupils are enrolled. The work was somewhat broken by the absence of several pupils who were sick, but the pupils present were doing good work. Since my former visit, the building has been completed by the addition of a ceiling.

The next day, I visited the school in District No. 52, where I found Mrs. R. B. Rice and 11 pupils hard at work. The term was drawing near the close, and much of this work was review. I was much pleased with the work in primary reading and the language work, which was based largely upon nature study. The pupils were also interested in picture study and in learning something of some of the great painters. I noted that the pupils were making good use of the dictionary put in and other reference works. Since my former visit, the well has been put in good condition, the door has been changed to open outward, new window boards and new shades have been provided for the windows, and a new flag and flag pole furnished. A neat and convenient bookcase has been placed in the room for the library.

It had been planned to hold the class exercises of the eighth grade classes of District 31 and 36 at the Eight Mile Center schoolhouse on the 24 inst., but when it was known that a picnic would be held on the 23rd at Allstott's grove, it was decided to have the classes present at the picnic and omit part of the program. The morning was given over to the discussion of some of the political issues to be voted upon at the coming election. In the afternoon, the writer delivered a short address and presented the diplomas to the classes. The picnic was a most enjoyable occasion, and the dinner was fully up to the Eight Mile standard.
