Northwest Attracts Attention as Summer Resort.

One result of the campaign for advertising the Pacific Northwest as a summer resort country will be noticed this month, when an excursion of several hundred people from Los Angeles and San Francisco will make a trip through Washington, British Columbia and Oregon, to view the wonders of the scenery, and become familiar with the great and growing cities of the Northwest. This year the Seattle Chamber of Commerce and other organizations have been making a strong bid for summer visitors. The Southern Pacific's excursion from California is one of the first results of this campaign. The excursionists will come north, starting July 25, over the Southern Pacific to Portland, thence by the Oregon and Washington to Seattle, where Canadian Pacific boats will be taken to Victoria and Vancouver. The rest of the route lies over the Canadian Pacific to Revelstoke, southward on Lake Kootenai and by rail to Spokane, and via the new North Bank road to Portland, where the homeward journey starts. This trip ought to give the Californians a fine idea of the Pacific Northwest, and should be the forerunner of much travel northward in this and other summer seasons. Just as California is the winter habitat of many people from the Northwest, this country should be, and in time will be the summer resort for Californians.

Republican County Assembly.

At a meeting of delegates from all of the precincts of Morrow County in an assembly held at Heppner, Oregon on the 1st day of July, 1910 it was unanimously decided to hold a Republican County assembly at Heppner, Oregon on August 16, 1910 at 7:30 p. m. for the purpose of recommending Republican candidates for county offices to be voted for at the coming primary election.

It was further unanimously decided by such meeting that the basis of representation in such county assembly should be two delegates at large from each precinct and in addition one delegate for each ten votes or major fraction thereof cast for R. R. Butler for presidential elector at the last election. This entitled the various precincts of the county to the following representation to wit:—Alpine 3, Cecil 5, Dairy 11, Dry Fork 4, Eight Mile 5, Gentry 6, Heppner 8, Irrigon 4, Lens 5, Lexington 8, Matteson 10, Mt. Vernon 13, Pine City 4, South lone 8, North lone 4, Well Springs 3, total 100 delegates.

It was further unanimously decided that Precinct Assemblies for the purpose of electing delegates to the County assembly be held in each precinct on Friday August 12, 1910 at such time of day as the precinct committees for such precinct may determine, and that in case a meeting should not be held the precinct committees appoint the number of delegates to which his precinct is entitled; that no proxies be allowed but that the majority of the delegates attending from any precinct vote the entire strength of such precinct in the County assembly.

The secretary was instructed to give notice through the press of the action taken by the meeting first named and to urge the Republican voters of each precinct to meet in precinct assembly on August 12 and elect delegates to the County Assembly, and to see to it that their respective precincts are fully represented in the County Assembly in order that the same may be thoroughly representative of the entire county.
