Great Phosphate Deposits.

Ontario, Or., July.—One of the largest phosphate areas known is located in southern Idaho, adjacent to Ontario, according to W. H. Waggoner, government expert, who has just issued a bulletin covering the field as he found it. The area in Idaho, Utah and Wyoming underlain by phosphate rock exceeds the phosphate areas of Florida and Tennessee, and compares with the large phosphate fields of northern Africa in Tunis, Algeria, Oren and Morocco.

Not only are these western deposits extensive in area, but the phosphate occurs in thick, readily workable beds, and chemical analysis of the rocks show them to be of high grade. Thus a favorable condition of quality and thickness and area of workable beds make these western phosphate deposits a valuable national asset.

According to the bulletin, interest in these lands has been stimulated by the recent conservation movement, since phosphate rock is generally considered to be one of the natural resources which is apparently being most rapidly depleted.

"At present," says the bulletin, "all the phosphate rock mined in Idaho is sent to California for fertilizer manufacture."

"In the manufacture of phosphate, phosphate rock may be used either raw or mixed with bit suano or dried blood before treatment with sulphuric acid. The usual proportions are about nine parts of sand to 10 parts of rock, ground so as to pass through a 20-mesh sieve. The total capacity of these plants is estimated at 1745 tons per day, but as yet the demand in California is below that figure, and the manufacturers are not running at their full capacity.

"The consumption of fertilizers in California is steadily growing, having increased from 10,000 to 35,000 tons during the last four years. As yet the principal consumption is in the citrus fruit belt of southern California and in grain growing sections of the state the use of superphosphate is increasing. Superphosphates are sold on a basis of the so-called 'available' phosphoric acid determined by the solubility of the phosphate in certain citrate solutions.

"There is little prospect that the western phosphates will be extensively mined in the near future owing to the great distance to present markets. However, with the growing demand in the west for fertilizers and the gradual depletion of the more accessible deposits, these western fields will undoubtedly come more and more into prominence. It would seem obvious that the utmost care should be exercised in granting mining rights, and, if possible, these rights should be granted with such control over the mining operations as to prevent wanton waste of low-grade deposits, which, though not at present of value for fertilizer manufacture, will be utilized at a more remote date."
