Railroads Need More Money.

Chicago Aug. 6.—The railroads intend to stand squarely upon the proposal that they need more money to keep pace with the growing demand for transportation, and if they cannot show this to the satisfaction of the Commission, then the day of Government ownership of railroads will have been greatly hastened.

This statement was made today by J. C. Stubbs, traffic director of all the Harriman lines and regarded as the foremost traffic expert of the country. Mr. Stubbs' declaration was made at the conclusion of a conference between the legal counsel of the Western railroads and their traffic representatives which lasted nearly a whole day. The meeting was called with a view of discussing the financial situation and forming plans for presenting before the Interstate Commerce Commission in the clearest manner the need of the railroads.

Look Out for Bad Checks.

Bad check artists are again abroad in the land and Heppner merchants and business men in general will do well to exercise more than the usual amount of care in cashing paper for strangers. Walla Walla and Portland have both been experiencing an epidemic of bogus check operators.

The harvest season is one time when the bad check men seem to get busy in eastern Oregon and the fact that no checks have been passed in Heppner before this is probably due largely to the vigilance of the city and county officers.

As a result of the recent visit of the worthless check man's visit to Walla Walla, four Garden City saloon proprietors are minus something like \$50 each.

About 11 o'clock Wednesday night two men claiming to be just from the harvest field, made a tour of the saloons together presenting checks drawn on the Third National bank, and bearing the signature of J. W. Baldwin. Not only did they bear this signature, but on each check was a rubber stamp adding what seemed to be official dignity. It was claimed that Baldwin is a rancher in the Mild ton neighborhood, and that the checks were drawn in payment of harvest wages, which sounded very plausible.

The houses which fell victim were the Idle Hour, the Oaks and those of John Bachold and Ghelson & Bishop. It is thought that the men left Walla Walla on the 11:30 train immediately after securing the cash, and as the character of the checks was not learned until banking hours yesterday, it is probable that they made their get-away. Warrants are out for their arrest, however, and it is not considered likely they can escape for long.
