Big Day for Farmers.

That Wednesday September 28 Farmers' Union Day at the district fair, is the biggest day of the fair ever held in eastern Oregon, is the sentiment being expressed by the members of the farmers' unions in Washtenaw and Morrow counties, the two divisions making up the third eastern Oregon agricultural district. The hundreds of union farmers scattered over the district have pledged themselves to gather exhibits of fruit, vegetables and grain which will go far toward making the entire week a success. But in addition to that they are planning to come to the fair on "Farmers' Union Day" and will bring their wives, their children and their hired men.

Officers of the union declare they will have a strong list of speakers and one of the most interesting programs of the entire week.

The Elks, as usual will have Thursday evening and the members of the local lodge declare that the people who have acquired the habit of looking forward to the Elks parade as one of the best features of the week, will have no occasion for disappointment. The brains of all "Bills," individually and collectively are being wracked for stunts new and original as well as entertaining and amusing. It is said that the parade will not only be a glittering pageant but that it will be a mirth provoker of the first order.—East Oregonian.

Favors Open River.

Portland, Or., Sept. 6.—Strong support for the Northwest movement to open the Columbia River to navigation from the sea far into British Columbia is given by Premier Wilfrid Laurier himself. Recently he sent delegations from Oregon and Washington at a conference held at Kelso, B. C. and gave his unqualified endorsement of the project. He signified his willingness to carry forward the work on his side of the boundary line, or if any way can be found, he will join with the United States in accomplishing the work as a whole. He has given orders for surveying the river on the Canadian side preparatory to starting work.

Many new towns of Oregon and Washington will be seen on the map now being issued by the Portland Commercial Club which brings this whole region up to date and fills up gaps noted in existing maps. Changes in the railroad situation will be shown and the accurate mapping of the two states will be a valuable aid in informing strangers of the opportunities that exist in the Northwest. Accurate data of each locality will be given on the map being reproduced from plates used by the Government Census Bureau.
