ROUNDUP AND FAIR GREAT SUCCESS

Record Breaking Attendance -- Every Pleased.

The Round-up has come and gone and proved a more huge success than ever, the fondest dreams of the organizers and promoters of the enterprise had dared to express. The attendance on the opening day was a true indication of the great public interest that had been aroused in the much heralded event and while the seating capacity at the grounds was totally inadequate to accommodate the number in attendance, the crowd was willing to make allowances and crowded into all the available space and stayed there until the close of the afternoon show.

Starting with a parade headed by the Portland Journal band mounted in a rough looking band wagon, the parade formed in front of the court house on Court street and marched down Court to Main, down Main to Alta and down Alta to the Round-up grounds. The various riders who were to engage in the various competitive events rode in the parade, the Indians daily decked in their war paint and feathers as in days of old and almost 40 of the younger society girls of the city, dressed as cow girls and riding typical pioneer cow ponies.

The program of the day, Thursday, was started promptly at 1:30 o'clock and each event was carried through without any unnecessary delays or long waits of any kind. This one thing proved more pleasing to the daily attendance than anything else and the management is to be congratulated on their ability to manage so many events and pull them off with the promptness that was done.

The program which had been distributed from day to day on the Round-up grounds, was with a few exceptions carried out complete and, considering everything, with as few accidents as could be expected under existing circumstances. A few persons were bruised in the various event pulled off, one rider had his arm broken, a lady rider was thrown and knocked insensible and a horse had one of its fore-legs broken, but considering the smallness of the enclosure, the large number in daily attendance and the unstable character of some of the railings, everything moved off in very nice order.

Special mention should be made of the fact that the Umatilla Indians were so largely represented in the Round-up and took such an active part in the events of the three days.

Special mention should also be made of the fact that it was through the efforts of Major Lee Moorhouse that the Indians were made to take so much interest in the show. The ability of the Major to control the Indians is well known and he occupied a prominent place at the head of his Indian braves in the Round-up parade yesterday morning.

Taken all in all, the Round-up was a huge success, both financially and otherwise and will become one of the annual events to be given in this city each fall. Next year the committee will secure larger and more commodious quarters in the east end of the city, which at other seasons of the year will be utilized as a public park and recreation grounds.

In spite of the fact that the Round-up proved more or less of a counter attraction, the fourth annual district fair of the Third Oregon Agricultural District closed with a blaze of glory and an attendance for the last three days of the week, unsurpassed in the history of the organization. —Live Wire.

WILL BOOST MORROW COUNTY

Money Will be Raised to Take Advantage of Railroad Co's Plan.

William Bittle Wells, special representative of the O. R. & N. and Southern Pacific railroads, addressed a good sized body of representative citizens at the court house in this city last Tuesday evening.

Mr. Wells came in compliance with a request from Morrow county citizens and the object of his visit was to explain to our citizens the methods employed by the railroads in advertising the resources of the state.

The county was fairly represented at the meeting. Business men from Ione and Lexington were present, and also a number of farmers were present.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Woodson.

Mr. Wells took up the subject of the railroad's methods of advertising and at some length told of the system in a clear and comprehensive manner.

The railroads are ready to inaugurate advertising campaigns to cost the county from \$1200 to \$5,000.

Mr. Wells spoke with much force in impressing the audience with the absolute necessity of local interest in order to be successful.

If the plan is adopted the railroad company will send here experienced photographers to get suitable and proper views. There will be artists to prepare maps and appropriate designs. Special and experienced writers will tell of the advantages and opportunities.

The first literature will consist of four sets of attractive booklets with supplementary folders from time to time.

The first installment of printing will consist of 80,000 copies of attractive printed matter.

A two page writeup will appear in the Sunset Magazine with a half page ad to appear for one year in the same publication.

The county will be given the benefit of the company's lecture bureau which will prepare colored slides for stereopticon views.

The company will hire space at county fairs for exhibits of our products.

It was unanimously voted to take advantage of the plan to cost \$1200.

A committee was appointed to take up the work immediately.

Tillamook and Bay City have taken effective steps to secure the improvement of their harbors. The port commissions of these two cities will cooperate with the national government in the work and will add to the fund provided for the purpose in the rivers and harbors appropriation. It is estimated that the work of improvement will cost about \$2,000,000. Tillamook and Bay City have pledged \$650,000 of this amount. The preliminary examination of the Tillamook waterways has just been made by Major Jav J. Morrow, the government engineer in charge of this district, and work on the improvement will be begun as soon as feasible.

September 21, the writer visited the school in District No. 60. Miss Eliza Stamp teaches this school. The work was moving along smoothly, and the pupils were taking a lively interest in their work.

The writer visited the school at Irrigon on Sept. 27 and 28. The enrollment is somewhat smaller than last year, but Prof. Kicker and Miss Kelly have the work well in hand. The school spirit is excellent, and the pupils are doing good work. The map work and use of Carpenter's Geographical readers indicated splendid interest in the geography work. It is a pleasure to note the growth of the trees on the school grounds. It will not be many years until these grounds will be a fine park.

The school building is one of the best equipped school buildings in the county. The wide hall, the slate blackboards, the slate window shades, the galvanized jackets surrounding the stoves, the excellent book cases filled with choice books, the globe, dictionary, and maps all speak of the wisdom and foresight of the school authorities. The out-buildings are well built and are kept in excellent condition.

It is well for school boards to give attention to the sanitary conditions of the school premises at this time of year. A little care now may save expensive cases of sickness. Circulars bearing upon this subject will be sent to the school clerks soon.

Oregon Products Exhibited in Chicago.

Portland, Or. Oct. 4.—Under the auspices of the Harriman lines, W. E. Benton is interesting Oregon communities in making exhibits at the United States Land and Irrigation Exposition, to be held in Chicago November 19 to December 4. Mr. Benton was engaged by Wm. McMurray, general passenger agent for the Harriman lines, who is familiar with the work of the former in handling the state exhibit at the Lewis and Clark fair and also the Oregon exhibit at the A.-Y.-P. exposition.

Features of the showing at Chicago will be fruit, grain, dairying and hogs. Each section of the state should take the fullest possible advantage of this opportunity to exploit its resources. It is intended to make the showing strongly representative and the individuality of the various communities will be preserved. Each section will receive valuable advertising in proportion to the interest shown. This is certainly a chance to get valuable publicity in the East without expense, other than the cost of collecting an exhibit, and all Oregon communities will, no doubt, fully co-operate with Mr. Benton in his work.

The Forest Service plans the seeding of between 5000 and 6000 acres of burned-over lands at a cost of approximately \$20,000. About 700 acres situated at the Bull Run watershed, the source of Portland's water supply, will be reforested in this way. The largest amount of planting will be done in the Mt. Hebo district south of Tillamook, which was burned over in 1847 and never reforested. On most of this area Eastern hardwoods will be planted.
