SUMMONS.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Morrow County.

The First National Bank of Heppner, Oregon, a corporation, plaintiff, vs. Elmer Stamp, B. P. Doherty, Edward McDaid and Ellen McDaid, defendants. To Elmer Stamp, B. P. Doherty, Edward McDaid and Ellen McDaid, the above named defendants:

In the name of the State of Oregon: You and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before six weeks from the 20th day of September, 1910, to wit:

On or before the 11th day of November, 1910, and if you fail to answer or otherwise plead, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in its complaint herein, namely, for judgment against the above named Elmer Stamp, in the sum of \$500.00, with interest thereon at the rate of ten per cent per annum from the 12th day of January, 1909, and for the further sum of \$60.00, attorneys fees, and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements of this suit and for a decree of this Court for the foreclosure of one certain mortgage described in said complaint, securing the payment of said promissory note, and executed by the said defendant, Elmer Stamp, said mortgage being upon and covering the following described real property, to wit: The east half of the northeast quarter, the southwest quarter of the northeast quarter, the southeast quarter of the northwest quarter of section ten, township one, north of range twenty-five, East of the Willamette Meridian.
