THE PROHIBITION DREAMERS.

Two years ago the salaried lecturers who were sent into Morrow county to espouse the prohibition cause told us that all sorts of good things would result if we would vote for prohibition.

The Gazette does not now or never did doubt the sincerity of the men who advocated these erroneous doctrines.

In fact, a majority of our good citizens took the matter seriously and voted for prohibition.

Now that we have had over two years of prohibition, we are not working on theory or prejudice, but we can draw our conclusions from actual facts. We have results from conditions that have been forced upon us.

One of the main arguments that the prohibitionists put forth was on the matter of taxation. They said that our taxes would be lower.

Instead of our taxes being lowered, we have the unusual condition of an increase of about 25 per cent in taxation.

Your tax receipts and the records ought to be enough proof to convince any one.

Figure it out any way that you like but the fact still remains that this increase, which is the greatest ever known in Morrow county, has occurred during the reign of prohibition.

The prohibitionists told us that after we had prohibition our county and our towns would enter into new era of prosperity. That families would flock into our county to take advantage of our improved moral conditions.

The awakening from this dream has shown that instead of moving in the families have been moving out to get away from our improved (?) moral conditions, where minors are staggering around under the soothing effect of local option beverages that are dispensed by the boot legger and the mail order house.

The annual reports of Morrow county's school population, as taken from the records in the office of the county school superintendent, show that in 1907, one year prior to the enactment of the local option law, our school population was 1696. In 1908, the year the law went into effect, the school population was 1664. In 1909, the population dropped to 1566, while this year the annual report only shows a population of 1480. Look at the big decrease under the two years of prohibition. The records show these silent facts.

The prohibitionists told us that

under the great moral wave of prohibition that our officers would be only firebrands and that our court rooms would smolder in dust and cob webs.

We will take for instance, the city of Heppner. From July 1, 1906, to July 1, 1908, the two years prior to the passage of the local option law, the records of the city recorder show that there were 116 arrests. From July 1, 1908 to July 1, 1910, for the same length of time under the prohibition regime, there were 118 arrests, and in nearly every case, strange to say, the charge was "drunk and disorderly."

From a moral standpoint, prohibition has been a great farce.

Thousands of dollars of ready cash that should be in circulation here has been driven to other towns. Every business man realizes this.

The question will soon be up to us whether we will vote for the sale of liquor under reasonable and sane regulation or whether we will continue the present surreptitious sale without any regulation whatever.
