Work on the general election ballot is now in progress at the office of the State Printer. The State Printer figures that the ballot for Multnomah county will be at least 13 feet in length, providing it is not made up in book form. The ballot in Morrow county will be about three feet in length.

The Home Rule Amendment which is backed and supported by a large majority of the business men of the state would be a safe and just law. The people within incorporated cities and towns are only asking to be given the right to regulate their own affairs by a majority vote. They are compelled to bear the burdens of city expense and surely they should be allowed to regulate affairs strictly belonging to the towns.

The action of the Farmers' Union in recommending that the county court make a liberal appropriation to assist in advertising Morrow county, shows a progressive spirit that should be encouraged by every citizen. This spirit is spreading all over the county. Business men and property owners will also subscribe liberally to create a fund to carry on the work in conjunction with the railroad company that will bring results.

At spare time and principally for amusement, Eugene Noble, of this city, from his residence lot comprising one acre of ground has this year sold poultry and garden vegetables to the amount of \$217, not counting what was given away, or the amount that was consumed for family use. In doing this Mr. Noble has sacrificed very little time that belongs to his business every day. This is very strong argument in favor of more intensified farming methods in Morrow county. Smaller farms and better cultivation would make a great change from present conditions. The Willow creek valley alone is able to comfortably support more people than we have in the entire county at the present time.

MR. MAHONEY AND THE WATER CODE.

Some of the political opponents of Hon. T. J. Mahoney are attempting to injure him in his candidacy for Representative by claiming that he was responsible for the passage of the Water Code passed by the last Legislature. The facts with reference to the passage of this act are that the bill was introduced first in the Senate by Senator Miller of Linn and Lane counties, and passed in the Senate by a vote of twenty-two to three and was called up in the House and passed by that body by almost a unanimous vote, the vote being fifty-five for the bill and one against it.

The only opposition to the bill was by the Oregon Light and Water Company and other large corporations, but in the face of a lobby maintained by the interests, fifty-five members of the lower house, irrespective of the party affiliations voted solidly for the passage of the act to their everlasting credit, as beyond question it is a law that is and will be the salvation of the individual riparian owner in the State of Oregon, as it has been in Idaho, Colorado, Arizona and other arid states who have similar legislation.

Mr. Mahoney, with fifty-four other members of the lower house voted for this bill owing to the then urgent necessity of the same, to prevent corporations who were

then busy in the field, from filing water rights and diverting the waters of the streams of Oregon from the use of the riparian owners, for the purpose of promoting various irrigation schemes.

Under the old system and as the law was before the enactment of this wholesome law any individual or incorporation could have filed water rights on Willow Creek and diverted its entire flow to the irrigation of the arid lands in the northern part of the county and the riparian owners along Willow creek would have been compelled to seek redress in the courts, and to have become entangled in long drawn-out, tedious lawsuits at enormous expense to each of them. In the eastern part of Umatilla county, several years ago, the riparian owners were compelled to employ lawyers and go into court to protect their rights. In fact to secure any water whatever with which to irrigate lands that had been under irrigation for many years. An immense amount of testimony was taken and it is estimated that more than \$50,000.00 has been expended by the litigants, and the cases, so we are informed, are still pending.

It is probable that a strict compliance with the provisions of the law can never be enforced on Willow Creek, owing to the fact that this stream has no permanent flow and during certain of the summer months furnishes no water for irrigation, it being necessary to utilize the water at its flood periods.

Nevertheless, each riparian owner's rights are now established for all time and no corporation or individual can devise a scheme or plan that will divest them of these rights.

Any individual or corporation seeking to appropriate water must do so absolutely subsequent and subject to the existing rights of the riparian owners as now established and each of them has added to his land a valuable and visible asset with all danger of costly lawsuits and endless litigation eliminated.

With the immense area of arid lands to which the waters of Willow creek could be diverted it was but a question of time until the creek owners, who have used these waters for years and invested large sums in valuable improvements, would have had to wage an expensive and interminable legal battle for the rights that under the water code are forever secured.
