Have you joined the Morrow County Boost Club?

The proposed prohibition search law is a return to the dark ages. It would be as bad as any of the old blue laws. How would you like to have some crank searching your private home? Fine business, this.

The biggest boost for Morrow County and the first thing to do for any man who joins the boost club, is to commence discouraging the idea of sending away for anything that is sold or can be produced in Morrow county. If you want to build up Morrow County, patronize Morrow County people.

The aggregate grain crop of the United States, as reported last week amounts to 4,955,000,000 bushels, which is 236,000,000 bushels more than were harvested last year. The estimated crop of 1910 is 115,000,000 bushels more than the largest crop on record, that of 1906. Some crops are smaller than in some previous years, but the estimated aggregate is as stated.

C. A. Barrett, republican nominee for joint Senator for Morrow, Umatilla and Union counties, is a conservative and careful business man. He is a heavy tax payer, and being a farmer as well as a business man in Athens, he is well qualified as to the needs of the district that he represents. Mr. Barrett is a pioneer of Eastern Oregon and having had experience in legislative matters, it would be a safe plan to elect him.

It would help the people of the different counties to solve the great problem of public road improvement. If the people of any county desire to raise funds they would have the right by a majority vote. If not they could vote it down, which is a fair proposition for all.

An attractive display of Morrow county apples in Minor & Co's show windows commands attention. Morrow county apples are good enough for anybody. They are tagged for sale at \$1.00 per box. Just change the sign to Hood River on the same apples and they would sell more readily for \$2.50 a box than they are selling now for \$1.00. This suggests an idea for Morrow County's Boost Club. The fruit was grown by S J Nilson, of Butter creek. For flavor and color these apples are tip top and they grew with very little care being paid to the trees.

BOWERMAN OR WEST?

Oswald West, democratic nominee for governor, with his press-service has visited Heppner. It is certainly a proper move to carry a good writer along, for West's speeches need a whole lot of embellishment as well as the injection of a lot of common sense, to make anything out of them at all.

Here in Heppner, West advocated nothing, stood for nothing. He did not outline a single constructive principle that was of any interest or of any concern as to the welfare of the State of Oregon.

Fernist the election of Bowerman, and for the election of West, is Mr. West's platform and all that had to talk about.

Even old time democrats were very much disappointed, if not disgusted, with West's appearance here.

Here is West's speech in a nutshell: "I stand on my record; I deliver the goods; I will oppose everything in opposition to the direct primary law."

What does Mr. West propose to do? How much dignity and influence would he add to the executive chair of the great State of Oregon? Who wants to repeal the direct primary law? Why, you could not stop it with a club. Who is foolish enough to think that the legislature will attempt to do anything with the direct primary law. Jay Bowerman has always been a supporter of the direct primary law. Favored its inception, favors it now.

What's the use of all this rot? What is this great record that Mr. West stands on that he is talking so much about? Is he standing on the fact that he was haggling around about taking out his naturalization papers in order to sever his relations with the English crown, when Jay Bowerman was fighting for the Stars and Stripes down in the Philippines, or is he standing on his record when he was lobbying against the bill presented for the handling of livestock which the railroads were opposed to, in contrast with Jay Bowerman who left his seat in the chair in the state senate to speak for the railroad amendment which was passed by Mr. Bowerman's vote, which the railroads opposed so bitterly.

In the primary campaign, Judge Bennett of The Dalles opposed West because Judge Bennett, who has won more cases against the railroads than any other man in the Northwest, thought that West was too closely allied with the railroads.

And why should the Republicans vote for Mr. West who stands for nothing, while on the other hand, Jay Bowerman stands for a progressive and business administration favoring immediate action toward securing to the people the full benefit of the state's resources.

Better methods in buying the supplies for the state institutions, which would mean a great saving to the taxpayers of the state, Merit, and not political "pull" in the selection of state employees. State regulation of the big corporations.

Jay Bowerman has the goods to deliver. West has delivered his.

SHALL WE BE WITHOUT REPRESENTATION?

At best, Morrow county's representation in the Oregon legislature is only a joint proposition.

In the upper house we are allowed a joint senator with Umatilla and Union, making a three cornered deal where Morrow county, which is the smallest of the three counties can only hope for third money.

In the hall of representatives we are tied onto Umatilla with one representative.

In the legislature, the counties with which we are joined, have representation galore.

In justice and fairness, Morrow county should be allowed one representative. To get a fair deal we have only one show, and that is to elect a Morrow county man in the person of T. J. Mahoney.

If Morrow county voters are awake to their interests, T. J. Mahoney will receive an overwhelming majority in this county.

Mr. Mahoney is an active, progressive and successful business man. Has everything at stake right here in Morrow county. Surely he will feel more inclined to work for our interests than a resident of Umatilla county.

And we believe that Umatilla county is fair enough not to want to hog the whole thing.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Morrow County.

The First National Bank of Heppner, Oregon, a corporation, plaintiff, vs Elmer Stamp, B. P. Doherty, Edward McDaid and Ellen McDaid, defendants.

To Elmer Stamp, B. P. Doherty, Edward McDaid and Ellen McDaid, the above named defendants:

In the name of the State of Oregon: You and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before six weeks from the 29th day of September, 1910, to wit:
