The Morrow County Boost Club is growing. Are you a member?

Why should the Republicans of Oregon elect Oswald West for governor? A hard question to answer.

Two years of prohibition. Look up your tax receipts and compare with former receipts. It looks like we are paying for something that we are not getting.

How about this 12 per cent decrease in Morrow county's school population under the prohibition regime? Our "improved moral conditions" have not brought many people here.

Police court records in Heppner show a greater number of arrests since the dry period than during the same length of time when the town was wet. Prohibition has been a farce and a complete failure in Morrow county.

Jay Bowerman, Republican direct primary nominee for Governor, should receive the support of every voter who believes in the direct primary. Reference to his record in the last three sessions of the Legislature show him to be a man of action. In fact, he has a statewide reputation of doing things. If elected Governor, he will continue to merit that reputation by initiating a number of reforms in the management of the state's business affairs—necessary changes that have come under his observation during the four months he has been serving the people of the state as Acting Governor.

FACTS STILL REMAIN.

The Gazette has no excuse to offer for the drinking of intoxicating liquors. Everyone is forced to admit that liquor, with its attendant excesses, is an evil.

Wine has been an evil since the first history of mankind. It is an evil to lay. It has always existed. It will probably always exist.

The liquor question is a problem now before the people. It is not an argument nor a contest in which the merits of liquor are to be decided at all. It is a question of proper methods in handling the evil. That is all.

Take every other great question, as the country grows older, the environments and conditions of mankind in a measure, are constantly changing. Our modes of living, in fact, our habits from cultivation and education are different, decidedly, from 50 years ago.

But the real man, the meanness of human nature has changed but little. The nature of mankind never has or cannot be changed by process of law.

In centuries, the skulls of men have been changed but little.

The prohibitionists claim that a prohibition law will make men be good. We have no evidence that prohibition has ever even alleviated the evils of liquor. Such laws have only forced men to resort to different and more vile methods in procuring drink.

Open saloons can be regulated. The bootlegger and dive keeper methods can never be. And why? Simply because the prohibition law forces a condition that protects the bootlegger, instead of driving out liquor. Men want liquor and in order to get it they must protect the surreptitious sale of the desired beverage. This is the undisputed history of prohibition ever since its inception in this country.

This is the reason that moral conditions, so far as drinking is concerned, are worse in Morrow county today than under the open saloon time. It is the only reason.

MORROW COUNTY'S LEGISLATIVE INTERESTS.

Morrow county voters should make an especial effort next Tuesday to give Tom Mahoney a big majority in this county.

It is not only a matter of county pride but a matter of vital interest as well as good business procedure.

Morrow county people are taking on new life in the way of effort for the advancement of interests in general. We will soon have a boost club that will be the greatest and most representative of any organization ever started here. We are beginning to realize that it is up to us and to us only to do something for ourselves.

The same condition exists in the way of legislative representation. This question is up to us good and strong.

No one would think of going over to Umatilla county to get that county to take up our boost club proposition and do the work for us for the reason that that county has enough to do to boost its own resources.

We have the same proposition in the way of legislative representation. Why should we go over to Umatilla to get a representative in the legislature? Umatilla county has enough legislation of its own to look after.

In no way can we have a representative in the legislature that we can wholly call our own, for at best it is a joint proposition with Umatilla county.

We cannot help this unfortunate condition and must do the best we can under the circumstances.

Mr. Mahoney is a permanent resident and property owner of Morrow county. He is a good business man and a good citizen. Morrow county needs him in the legislature. Morrow county should stand by him next Tuesday.

Umatilla county has always been inclined to be fair with us. Umatilla will be represented by one regular and one joint senator and two regular and one joint representative in the lower house in the legislature. Our sister county will be well represented.

Morrow county surely ought to be entitled to one representative. Tom Mahoney is our only show.

WEST NO FRIEND OF STOCKMEN.

In defeating the bill before the last legislature, to regulate the speed of stock trains, Oswald West helped to work a hardship on the stock interests of the state. The Pendleton Live Wire sums up the result as follows:

From Huntington to Portland is approximately 400 miles; if the railroad moves its cars at 15 miles per hour, the run is made in 28 hours and the stock laid down in Portland without the necessity of stopping to water and feed stock.

If, on the other hand, the stock train moves at a speed of nine miles per hour, it takes 44 1/2 hours to reach Portland and the stock must be unloaded for feed and water at the end of the 36th hour. This requiring 10 hours additional, brings the stock in Portland at the end of 54 hours. By the passage of the law they would have been at their destination in 28 hours.

Every minute that the cow, sheep, or hog is on the car it is losing flesh, the shrinkage on a beef steer between Portland and Huntington estimated at 70 pounds for the 28 hours, and over 100 pounds for the 54 hours. One hundred pounds of beef at six cents a pound means \$6 loss to the owner of each steer in the shipment—at the receiver's end of the line it means a scarcity of meat and consequent increase in price.

Aside from the loss in money to the farmers and stockmen of the country, this law that West boasts he defeated and pledges himself that he will veto, if elected, is a law providing that the railroads shall run all stock trains at a speed not less than 15 miles per hour. By defeating the law West truly "delivered the goods" to the railroads by whom he is owned.

East of Chicago the railroads of

their own accord give to stock trains an average speed of 19 miles per hour. West of the Missouri the average speed of stock trains two years ago was less than nine miles per hour. The average speed of Oregon stock trains is not known, but old shippers assert it to be less than nine miles per hour.

WHAT THE HOME RULE BILL REALLY IS.

It gives cities and towns the right to have saloons or no saloons. It gives the people who live in cities the right to vote on and decide this question themselves. It puts the control of the liquor traffic into the hands of the voters of each precinct, so that every residential district in a city or town is protected. It means real local option. All state criminal laws are maintained. Under it the farmer has the same protection he now enjoys. It is a law fitted to local conditions as they actually exist in every section of the State. It gives absolute control of the liquor traffic, particularly in towns and cities, where it is most needed. It will prevent the county from wiping out the city vote on city measures. It is a law which makes prohibition possible where wanted, and impossible where not wanted. It means regulation which regulates.

Indications are that Lafferty will lead the ticket in Eastern Oregon.
